DO MIRACLES EXIST? Jan de Vries

This is an interesting little book by a Dutch doctor working apparently in Scotland and practising alternative medicine of various kinds. It consists largely of anecdotes, some remarkable and some less so, strung together in a rather loose way. Its style is simple, and one is often left wondering what conclusion is being suggested. There are some serious warnings about dabbling with the occult. It seems strange that it should have been awarded the Dag Hammarskjöld award (unless that is a reference to the author and not to this book). The unusual title in no sense indicates a contribution to the debate on miracles.

Collections of essays are rarely satisfactory and this must especially be true of a volume which includes 21 essays in 95 pages.

Some of these contributions are strident, some are tetchy, some are simply thin. On the other hand there are others of the first importance and, for them, this is a book to read. It is intended as a re-affirmation of the true Church of England, standing against innovation and humanism. The writers include supporters of the Anglican Campaign, the Prayer Book Society, 'Parson and Parish', the Anglican Society, the Christian Affirmation Campaign and the Church of England in South Africa.

Among the contributions there is Enoch Powell's memorable lecture on 'A National Church' delivered at St. Lawrence Jewry, and Basil Watson's essay on 'Patronage'. Both are required reading.

Bernard Smith's article on 'Church Schools in a Multi-Faith Society' is a marvel of succinct writing but there is a book yet to be written on that subject and we must hope that Mr. Smith will tackle it.

THE WINNING CHURCH Church Growth Evangelism for Today**Roland E. Griswold**

The author is a Pastor in the Advent Christian Churches in the U.S.A. and states that the aim of his book is to offer ideas to the local church to help develop its evangelism strategy. Each chapter follows a basic plan of Introduction, Bible Base, Implication and Application. The first four chapters deal with the theme of Church Growth and the discovery of Gifts within the church. The succeeding chapters do not appear to follow any particular pattern and discuss such themes as the need to know your neighbourhood, the priority and strategies of evangelism and the need for discipleship training. One cannot help but be challenged by the author's enthusiasm for evangelism, and by the way in which he asks the most disconcerting questions. Despite all this, one must ask if yet another book on evangelism is necessary especially when some of our British authors have done a rather more thorough job.

WARNOCK REPORT—A Critique by C.A.R.E. Ed. C.A.R.E. Committee

This is a good summary of the Warnock Report with a clear explanation of some of the failings and deficiencies of it. However some of these deficiencies are also found in C.A.R.E.'s arguments, e.g. its appeal to the emotions with its description of the developing foetus; also its failure to indicate that the abortion law puts a legal view of the embryo as having less than human rights.

The argument for the embryo being fully human from fertilisation, with full human rights is well put by C.A.R.E. but is spoilt by hardly mentioning the main objections raised to this, e.g. 'natural wastage' which is thought to be quite a high percentage; and the passage on miscarriages in Exodus 21.

It is dealing more with the Warnock Report's failure to find these fundamentals than about test-tube babies.
