### A Joyous New Year

E welcome this opportunity of passing on to our readers in all parts of the world a New Year's message of greeting, wishing them a year of spiritual prosperity and progress. As we pen these lines, behind us lies the old year with all its holy, hallowed memories. To some perhaps it has brought a harvest of heartache and humbling;

upon the anvil of adversity and affliction God has permitted their lives to be hammered into shape, welding them into His great love-plan for life. Probably there has been the vain attempt to interpret the trials and the tears. We have learnt that God alone can transmute these enigmatical experiences into the fine gold of Christian character.

To so many of us the past year has been so full of the miracle of God's leading. His hand has conducted us safely through the engirdling dangers. In retrospect we are able to trace a pattern in much that at one time seemed so hopelessly disconnected and unrelated. In the mysterious phases of our pilgrimage we are able to distinguish the mosaic of gracious design. With Frances Ridley Havergal we can sing:

Our yet unfinished story is tending all to this, To God the greatest glory, to us the greatest bliss.

The future lies hidden behind an inscrutable veil, yet beyond that veil stands God—the All-sufficient.

Standing on the threshold of 1935 hope wells up fresh and strong within. To those possessed of the advent hope each new year brings added aspiration and expectation. This year may hold for the Lord's people the crown and consummation of their heart's longing. Already to love-anointed eyes the golden streaks of Eternity's dawn gild the eastern horizon. Some even now catch the sound of the chariot wheels of the Coming King. The "little while" is almost

o'er; the bridal banquet is spread, and the redeemed but wait the Bridegroom's summons to the air.

God's hand is beckoning us on—not towards sunset, but to the sunrise; not merely to rest but to glorious realisation. To the life in God the present is always the prelude to the deeper, richer harmony ahead. Some larger and more magnificent develop-

ment and transformation is constantly taking place in the Spirit-moulded life. We are moving on towards the Ocean, and as we onward go the river of experience deepens and widens—its movement is less noisy, yet it moves with greater rhythm and swiftness to the Goal.

What shall the new year bring? is the question uppermost in many minds at this time. What new challenge to faith, what further interpretation of life, what fresh fulfilment of promise and prophecy, what fuller unfolding of the divine plan? What comfort to know that

"God holds the key of all unknown."

That His hand is moulding our morrows.

One of our first reflections must be that 1935 will to a great extent be determined by ourselves. The spirit in

which we enter the new year, and the attitude we maintain throughout must vitally influence the ultimate record and result. We have it within our power to make or mar. Whilst we may not determine the content of the year as regards the unforeseen circumstances, yet we may meet them with a courage that will mean conquest. What God will do tomorrow depends largely upon what we do to-day. The present surrender may be the prelude to the triumph of the future. Therefore it behoves us to give ourselves unsparingly to the constraint of the Spirit that is now laid upon us, thus laying the foundation of a life of richer fellowship in God.

Genesis xxviii. 15. Let us consider the challenge which the new year brings to each believer in Jesus Christ.

There is the challenge of those unclaimed promises of the Word of God. Each year they have confronted us, full of invitation and encouragement to possession. We have looked upon them with a sigh of longing, and almost crossed the Jordan of our fears, but still they remain as a rebuke to our unbelief and to our consequent spiritual poverty. At the portal of another new year this uncashed wealth, this potential treasure, invites our wholehearted response. Shall we let it lie for ever thus? Or shall we signalise 1935 by launching forth into the fulness of God as revealed in those promises, making this the occasion of a

greater trust in the Lord. Then there is the challenge of the Christless masses which lie all about our path. The fields are white unto harvest-they await the consecrated hands of the reaper. Think of those unreached districts in our own land that are ripe for the blessed Foursquare Gospel message; areas unpenetrated by those who bear the glad news of a full-orbed evangel. They call insistently for greater light and spiritual instruction. Shall that challenge awake no answering action on our part? Are we content to remain unmoved by such obvious obligations? Let us go forth amid the ruin and chaos with healing in our hearts and in our hands—out among the wounded and the dying—to pour into broken and blighted lives the balm of Calvary's Love.

In looking back over 1934 there is much to call forth praise for that which has been achieved under the Foursquare flag, yet how much more might have been accomplished had the funds been forthcoming. How many calls could have been answered and how many gaps filled had the Lord's people been more faithful in their sacrifice to Him and His kingdom. A great burden of responsibility rests upon the Foursquare Gospel Movement to evangelise this and other lands. It is a God-given responsibility and privilege that we dare not ignore nor surrender to others. Let us in 1935 rise to the call of our risen Master and push the battle to the gate. The opportunities are tremendous; the needs are many. Linked to Him all things are possible.

In our service let us bear in mind that we are not merely workers for God, but "workers together with Him," and this makes such a great difference to all that we undertake.

Then further we trust that the new year will see in the life of our Churches a greater freedom in the Holy Ghost. There is every reason why this should be so. The Holy Ghost Himself is ready to deluge the whole movement with a mighty baptism of power—power that shall rest not only upon a few of its leaders, but upon all its branches and members. A freedom that shall quicken its gatherings, making them radiant and vibrant with divine liberty and energy. A freedom that will transform our service for God, loosening the lips and lifting the life on to a plane of praise and power.

This can mark 1935 providing we are prepared to pay the price. It may mean that some of the things in which we have learnt to glory may have to go down into death. Our self-reliance, which we regard

as so vital to success, will have to be exchanged for a deeper dependence God. For us to have freedom in God means that God must have freedom in us. All that obstructs God's path in us must be removed. The trouble often is that these things are out of place or in wrong proportion in our lives. Whatever makes for bondage should go to the Cross. This is the place of deliverance. It may be that we need setting free from the domination of our disposition. It is as we recognise and realise the sovereignty of the Spirit within that we shall be brought into wondrous spiritual liberty. The "law of the Spirit," when obeyed, always results in enlarged freedom in God. To the life in the Spirit there are no boundaries other than

those defined by the divine will.

God cannot do great things through a bound people; their fetters must be snapped. God is waiting to prove what He can do through consecrated personality plus Pentecost. The Holy Spirit is ready to make real in the Lord's people that "glorious freedom of the children of God."

This freedom in the Holy Ghost will save us from a life that is pitched in the minor key. It will clothe life in the garments of gladness.

Perhaps as we look on into the unknown there is born within us an overwhelming sense of the need of guidance. The fear that we may miss the way grips us. And so we cry out—

I dare not take one step alone, Lead Thou me on.

What an amount of anxiety we shall be spared if we can only reckon on the unfailing leading of

God. It is those "false steps" that have proved so costly in the past.

Dr. Boreham refers in one of his books to an experience of his when he first settled as a minister in New Zealand. He says, "It was my privilege to entertain one of the most gifted, most experienced, and most gracious of our ministers. I felt it to be a priceless opportunity, and I sought his counsel concerning all my early ministerial difficulties. "Can a man be quite sure," I asked, "that in the hour of perplexity, he will be rightly led? Can he feel secure against a false step?" Dr. Boreham continues, "I shall never forget his reply. He sprang from his deck chair and came earnestly towards me. "I am certain of it," he exclaimed, "if he will but give God time! Remember that as long as you live," he added entreatingly—"GIVE GOD TIME!"

Oh that we could always remember that God's guarantee includes the promise of guidance for all the days; that the path of the oncoming years is paved with promises of unfailing leading. The future as it opens up before us may appear maze-like in its bewildering intricacies, but "He goeth before" into all that awaits us. As Spurgeon aptly observes, "though we know not where the road winds, we know where it ends." And so we can sing—

All my days and all my hours, All my will and all my powers, All the passion of my soul, Not a fragment but the whole, Shall be Thine, dear Lord, Shall be Thine.

Furthermore shall we seek in the new year as never before to make Christ pre-eminent in life and ministry? Perhaps in some things we have been a trifle too prominent, and our prominence has hidden Him somewhat. We have not intended that it should be so, yet unconsciously we have drawn attention to ourselves. It is only as He is magnified that Christian life truly achieves its highest end, and in order for Christ to be magnified we must be prepared to sink into insignificance; to be lost sight of.

All the manifold ramifications of our work should exist for the supreme purpose of making Him known. Sometimes they get in the way and hide His glory. Men may marvel at us, but our aim should be for them to marvel at Him.

We must make Him pre-eminent in our preaching—pre-eminent in our worship—pre-eminent in our teaching—pre-eminent in our living.

In closing let us express our gratefulness to God for the way in which He has set His seal upon the ministry of the Elim Evangel. Evidences of this are continually coming to hand from those whose lives are being enriched by the message which it brings week by week. We are also thankful to our readers for their prayerful and practical co-operation in seeking to enlarge the circle of the Evangel's influence in this and other lands. We trust that 1935 may register a decided increase in the circulation. To this end let us lay ourselves out in united endeavour. This could most certainly be accomplished if many of our readers would definitely set themselves to secure at least one new subscriber. Remember that each fresh home to which the Evangel is introduced means potential blessing to that family circle; who can foresee what glorious things may result from this. service may kindle a fire in some heart that shall lead to most blessed revival.

when the end of life's testimony will come. It may be quite sudden, and what would it mean to be ushered into His presence and to be ashamed!

Notice that the apostle says, "We must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that everyone may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad." You see the bad is to be dealt with as well as the good. We shall all be gathered in the Father's home as His children, for we have been born into His family and there is a place prepared for us yonder. Not one who has been thus regenerated will be missing. That is glorious, but, beloved, when we get there, what is it going to mean to you and to me if we have walked carelessly and wrought selfishly? It is so easy to presume upon

and think, "Oh, yes, I shall arrive; I will be there." That is true, but what will it mean to you and to me when we do get there? For, our characters will be revealed then as we stand before Him whose eyes are as a flame of fire—the motives of our hearts will be laid bare—and our dealing with our brothers and sisters in Christ will be taken into account (Rom. xiv. 10). Yes, the whole of life from the moment we trusted Christ till our translation will be adjudicated by Him then. "If any man's work abide . . . he shall receive a reward. If any man's work shall be burned he shall suffer loss; but he himself shall be saved, yet so as by fire "(I. Cor. iii. 14, 15).

Some of you will have heard of Dr. Cuyler. There is an incident in his life that comes to remembrance. His little boy, George, was very seriously ill. The doctor gave no hope of his recovery. Mrs. Cuyler

was sitting at the bedside almost heart-broken at the prospect of losing her treasure. George was a true believer and had been seeking to comfort his mother with the thought of what it would mean for him to be with the Lord Jesus Christ, and to be there to welcome mother and father when they came. ### The Revival in Manchester

NHE writer went to the Free Trade Hall, Manchester's largest and most famous auditorium, on a Saturday night in October, only to find that it was impossible to obtain even standing room. Hundreds had been turned away and although he used all the influence he possessed admission was not secured.

After waiting half an hour or more the writer went home interested and perplexed. Not to be able to obtain even standing room in Manchester's largest hall for a Saturday night religious gathering was an unusual experience. He therefore decided that next day he would look for an explanation of this unusual phenomenon. The next day, Sunday, he went to the Piccadilly Theatre where Principal George Jeffreys was announced to preach in the afternoon.

Even then he had to join the queue of those waiting admission. Whilst in the Theatre waiting for the commencement of the service he heard a gentleman from Rochdale, who knew Alderman Dearden well, speak of the Alderman's interest in the Foursquare Gospel work. Obviously the gentleman was a well-informed religious worker who knew all about the Free Church Council, etc., and like the writer he wondered how it came about that whilst churches, chapels, mission halls, etc., were fighting an uphill battle, Principal George Jeffreys was filling to capacity churches and halls that had been vacated by other religious organisations.

The service that followed gave the explanation. The Principal preached with great power, as a man with authority, the authority of the Lord God Almighty. He made the divine plan of salvation clear. When he hit sin he hit it hard and when he talked of

it was lovely. Conversions were clearly expected and converts were made in large numbers.

Mr. Jeffreys came as an ambassador for God to do definite work for God and the work was done with power. Amazing results followed! Then came the healing service, and a great lump came into the writer's throat at the response. When an opportunity was offered for those seeking healing to come forward they rose up all over the place, great numbers of them obviously in great need of healing. More wonderful still many were healed. The power of God was manifested in a most definite manner and although the writer failed to understand, he was simply amazed at what he saw. Also he wondered how he came to have lived so many years in complete ignorance of these modern miracles of healing. He was familiar with the claims of the Christian Scientists, but here the work of God was done openly. Definite results were expected and obtained.

The writer was so impressed that he remained for tea and the evening meeting. Again the power of God to save and heal was made manifest. He did not yet understand but he accepted the facts as he witnessed them. He resolved to investigate further. He went after the world-famous Revivalist to Whitworth Hall, Grosvenor Street Church, and other public halls. Again and again he saw crowds seeking salvation and claiming and obtaining healing. He then bought up copies of all the literature he could find and found further proofs. Then he said this is a modern

and I am ready to serve under his banner. He invited Mr. Jeffreys to come to Eccles and promised help. The response was almost too quickly given, but with a few days' preparation Eccles Town Hall was packed to hear the Principal. No vacant seats were available even in the gallery at the last of the four advertised services.

No less than 169 men and women put up their hands as evidence of their acceptance of Christ as their Saviour, and the platform was full to overflowing of those seeking healing.

He was further impressed that the Revival Party were careful to make no exaggerated claims of healing but waited until the claims were confirmed.

Some wonderful testimonies have been given of healing during the Manchester campaign and on Sunday hundreds of men and women were publicly baptised at a great meeting in the Free Trade Hall. It was a wonderful and impressive sight which the writer is not likely to forget.

Opportunity came to make Principal Jeffreys' personal acquaintance. He came to the conclusion that here was a real man, who really believed he was appointed by God to do definite work for God and that work he was determined to do, no matter what the cost might be. The results justified his faith. By their fruits ye shall know them," and the fruits of the Manchester campaign have been good and beautiful to behold.

The writer is more than grateful for having been in personal contact with Principal George Jeffreys and his band of men and women whose hearts God hath touched.

#### I. The Christmas Mystery—A Babe.

#### What Next?

A new patent that will revolutionise What next? the long-distance flying of aircraft is now being tested. The scheme is to launch highly-loaded highspeed aeroplanes from carrier aeroplanes in mid-air. #### The Scripture Union Daily Portions: Meditations by Pastor H. A. COURT

Sunday, January 6th. Genesis iii. 14-24.

"Her seed . . . shall bruise thy head" (verse 15).

Satan struck the first blow, and God is not slow to take up the challenge. Notice that Satan attacks God's best. That upon which God sets the highest value in that it bears His image is chosen for the target of Satan's malicious assault. And when God decides to repulse the attack it is an ironical fact that God selected as His channel that which had collapsed in the fight. Thus early in the affairs of the fall came the promise of redemption. Despite their sin God gave comfort to our foreparents in this promise of deliverance. It is true that they were not actually able to participate in the victory, but it must have been a consolation to them to know that mankind was not irretrievably lost. It was cheering to know that there was One who could solve this great problem, who could unravel this terrible tangle. And so came the promise in the fulfilment of which we daily rejoice.

Monday, January 7th. Genesis iv. 1-16. "Am I my brother's keeper?" (verse 9).

History repeats itself. Not actually in fratricide, although this world has in this respect produced many Cains. But the attitude of many towards their brethren might be expressed in the question here asked. It seems inexplicable that men and women in Christ should be so indifferent to the cry of their less fortunate brethren. Unfortunately we must admit that it is a fact. Yet Scripture shows clearly that upon each of us is imposed an unmistakable duty. It is not so much a question of ability. One need not be a preacher to bring Christ to the unsaved man. And yet despite the responsibility clearly shown and the simplicity of the task there are those who affect the callous attitude of "Am I my brother's keeper?" It seems to me that those who act in this way are not in very close fellowship with God. You cannot live in contact with Christ without becoming like Him.

Tuesday, January 8th. Genesis v. 1-5, 21-32.

" Enoch walked with God" (verse 24).

What a grand experience. Yet I need not be envious, for a like experience can be mine. Enoch chose it for himself: it was not forced upon him. And as Enoch had a choice so have I. If I am not enjoying such a walk the fault is my own. Provision is made, and the welcome is warm and sincere. Let me examine myself to find why I am not participating in this blessing. Am I out of His will? If so I have not a desire for

this holy walk. With a return to His will there will be a reviving of holy desire. Consider again that if I am displeasing Him by some disobedient act He will not encourage a walk with Him. To walk with Him I must be resigned to His will. He must be the strong One who will wield an influence over me. And then as we go through life together I shall benefit by the many profitable things He will bring into my life.

Wednesday, January 9th. Genesis vi. 5-22.

"Thus did Noah" (verse 22).

What a fine testimony. If only we could all have something like that written about us. I am afraid, however, that we too often hesitate before carrying out the divine injunction. We question and probe into the matter. We allow our own puny wisdom to enter into it. We express our opinion, and dare to differ from our Maker. If our children dare question our instructions we punish them. Yet we ourselves are often very lax in the matter of our heavenly Parent's commands. This may account for some of the punitive happenings in our lives. We should not be puzzled at the seeming chastisements if we examined ourselves more frequently. We would soon understand that God cannot be trifled with, and is subjecting us to discipline. daily examination of our conduct would be most helpful. On how many days I wonder could it be recorded "Thus did -

Thursday, January 10th. Genesis vii. 1-12.

"Come . . . into the ark " (verse 1).

That is the reward of obedience. There is always a "come" when you have done His bidding. Obedience brings a peculiarly blessed joy. There is an extra sense of the presence of God. Implicit obedience to the Lord's word invites the criticism of the world, but it gains the notice of God. He sees. Very often we forget that. When Noah obeyed the voice of God by building the ark he was unconsciously aiding in his own protection. It was worth while whatever others might have said. Obedience is the most profitable exercise known to man. It may have its costs. It certainly has its compensations. The attitude of Noah's reighbours can only be conjectured. Being so degenerate they were probably very unfavourable to this new project. But at best this is supposition. His gains, however, are not speculation. He was invited into the ark.

Friday, January 11th. Genesis vii. 13-24.

"The Lord shut him in" (verse 16).

That meant security. No one and nothing could enter when God shut the

door. There was a fearful storm outside the ark. But with the door shut Noah and his family had nothing to fear. What mattered the howling of the wind and the beating of the rain when God had shut the door! It is only when we govern our own affairs that we find ourselves in trouble. Had Noah had control of the door he might have been tempted to leave it open, or at any rate, ajar. We humans are strange make-ups. We toy with the things that would destroy us. When God says kill we spare, and that which we have spared would turn and rend us. Had Noah been in charge of that door others might have entered, and the whole purpose of the flood would have been lost. God was destroying wickedness. Then He must in shutting Noah in shut that out. There is only one course for us to pursue. We must leave all doors with God.

Saturday, January 12th. Genesis viii. 1-12.

"The rain . . . was restrained" (verse 2).

It does not rain for ever. There is an end to it. The ark was only a temporary building. After so many years of liberty it must have seemed a prison to Noah. But there came a day when the now familiar sound of beating rain suddenly ceased. It was an indication that their temporary life was over, and they would be able to resume a more normal mode of living. Many of our experiences are like that. God is working out a purpose, and we are subjected to quite a number of uncomfortable and uncongenial happenings. But these are only temporary matters. When their purpose is served the rain will stop. And that means that you will be able to open the window and see the sun. Are you in an ark like that now? Does the incessant patter of the rain trouble you. It will not be for long, and then He who sent the rain to test you will restrain it.

# 'Ambitious to be

By Dr. HARVE

In the Second Epistle to the Corinthians, chapter five, verses nine and ten, we have the Word of the Lord thus recorded: "Wherefore we labour, that, whether present or absent, we may be accepted of Him. For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that everyone may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad."

This is a message sent to the Church of God at Corinth and to all the saints which were in all Achaia. Therefore, when we read that the apostle says, "We labour to be accepted of Him," we recognise that this has no application to the sinner, to the unsaved soul.

Not the labour of my hands Can fulfil Thy law's demands; Could my zeal no respite know, Could my tears for ever flow; All for sin could not atone; Thou must save, and Thou alone.

But being saved, it is of supreme importance that the child of God should recognise the privileged obligation of the Christian life to let its testimony be altogether to the

#### GLORY OF THE NAME

that is above every name. This was a matter of deep concern to the Apostle, who says, "Wherefore we labour." That is not a bad translation. In the margin of your Bible you will see another word, "endeavour," and those of you who use the Revised Version will notice in the text the word, "aim." But the best word is that which is found in the margin of the Revised rendering, viz., "ambition"-"This is my ambition," says the Apostle. "This is the dominating passion of my life, this is the thing to which all my energies are directed through the enabling grace of God." Ambitious for what? "To be accepted of Him." But you must put the right emphasis there. We would perhaps get a little more of the thought in the heart of the apostle as inspired by the Holy Spirit if the word "acceptable" rather than "accepted" had been used. It is one thing to be accepted in the Beloved. It is quite another thing for you and me to so live as to be acceptable to Him. Again in the Revised Version we have the preferable rendering of this latter word so that the phrase would read, "Ambitious to be well pleasing Is not that magnificent? The child of God filled with the ambition to be well pleasing unto Him in every detail of life and service.

What a thrill comes to the heart as we read of what was said concerning Enoch in those far-away days when God saw "that the wickedness of man was great in the earth and that every imagination of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually." But amid all the horror and moral down-drag of that day this one man so walked with God and lived for God's glory that he had this testimony borne of him, "He pleased God." It is fine to have such a testimony at the end of life; but why should it not be said of us at the end of each day?

Jonathan Edwards used to take stock every night before retiring. He would review his walk and work through the hours that had gone to see how far his life and labours had been in harmony with the divine mind. Why not let us take stock? Having committed ourselves to the keeping power of God and seeking the help of the Holy Spirit as we start out upon each day's details and duties, then as we come to its close, after thus going over it all in the light of His Word, taking stock and committing it all to Him, what a joy it would be to get the echo of

#### THE STILL SMALL VOICE

through our heart, "My child, I am well pleased." That would be a blessed pillow for the heart as well as for the head. And is not that an ambition worth possessing? Why not let it mark our lives each day? How rich toward God we might become, and what blessing the Holy Spirit could minister through us to others as we sought to follow more closely in the steps of our Master, who was able to say—"I do always those things which please My Father."

For illustrative exemplification of this, let us turn to the record of the life of our adorable Lord and consider two references in the first Gospel. In Matthew iii. 17, He is coming up out of the water after His baptism, the heavens are opened, the Spirit, like a dove, descends upon Him, and the Father's voice is heard, saying, "This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased." In the seventeenth chapter and the fifth verse, the voice is heard again. He is on the Mount of Transfiguration this time. The three years of public ministry are hastening on and the Father bears the further word of testimony, "This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased; hear ye Him." Yes, it is well to take heed to what Moses

taught and to what Elijah said, but let no one come between your soul and the Son of My love. His is

#### THE ONLY AUTHORITATIVE VOICE.

His is the only infallible word to which you must give earnest heed perpetually.

The first voice would have had reference to the years that lay behind. Those thirty years, which were spent for the most part, no doubt, in Nazareth, which had not altogether an enviable reputation. It lay just a little off the main thoroughfare, so that anything could go on there. You know the contempt with which people referred to that part of the country, "Galilee of the Gentiles," and that was where our blessed Lord spent most of His days. In that undesirable atmosphere and amid uncongenial circumstances He lived in the home and wrought at the carpenter's bench, and the Father bears testimony concerning His life and labour in that village home and workshop: "My beloved Son, I am well pleased."

Fellow child of God, are you, am I, pleasing the Father well? Where I live, in my home? And in my place of business, what kind of work am I turning out? Is it of such a character that the heavenly Father could look down and say, "I am well pleased?" If this thought were ever in our hearts and minds, would it not revolutionise some of our lives? How careless we can become in our homes in the way in which we talk to one another and treat one another. We get through our daily toil somehow, too often in a

#### CASUAL SORT OF WAY.

And surely this reveals the fact that there is something wrong and something lacking! We are not possessed with this ambition that fired the soul of the apostle. For instance, it is so easy to join in the hymn, "Oh, for a thousand tongues to sing my great Redeemer's praise," and within half an hour of doing so, it is possible to be using the one tongue I have, to say something unkind and maybe untrue concerning a fellow believer. This it is which hurts the heart of God and spoils my testimony. Beloved, in the sphere of our daily calling let this have its application that we may live to commend the gospel among those with whom we have to do. How often

it has been said, "Oh, yes, he gets through somehow or other; he wants to go off to that meeting." God does not want us at the meeting if it means that to get there we are slack or slipshod in our business.

We cannot please Him well in any witness or work we seek to take up in His name if we are inconsistent in the home and in the sphere of our daily calling. What a testimony it would be if each child of God had this as the dominating passion of heart and life! In the home, in the place of toil, among

as well as in the Church fellowship, to be well pleasing unto the Lord. Let this be the supreme ambition of mind and heart and let nothing divert us therefrom at any time or in any way.

The Apostle says that the incentive to this in his own soul lies in the fact, "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ." That is quite a good translation, but in the Revised Version we read, "We must all be made manifest." Our Lord reminds us that there is nothing hid, which shall not be made manifest. Yes, but let us take it more literally and so get a very solemn and searching truth which the Holy Spirit would have us take to heart. " For we must all come without disguise before the judgment seat of Christ." Then it is possible for me to assume a disguise, to have on a veneer of spirituality with which to deceive others, and myself also in time. This may continue right along until the judgment seat is reached where the disguise must drop off. God forbid that any one of us should continue another moment with any such disguise, trying to veil our true character. It is not difficult to do this-to pretend to be other than I really am so that others may be deceived, but we cannot deceive Him, with whom we have to do. Is there anything more startling for the child of God than to know that

#### ACCORDING TO THE WORD

in John's first letter, chapter two, verse twenty-eight, he or she may be "ashamed before Him at His coming?" Yes, it is possible for the believer at the judgment seat to blush with shame. God forbid that that should be the lot of any one of us. May the Holy Spirit search us thoroughly and see if there be any way of grief or sin tolerated in these lives and hearts so that it may be put away, for we do not know

### What will Happen in 1935?

When these things begin to come to pass, then look up, and lift up your heads; for your redemption draweth nigh.—Luke xxi. 28.

TE stand upon the threshold of a new year. What does it hold? I believe that it holds one of the greatest dramas that has ever appeared on the stage of this world's history.

The year that has just passed from us has been one of great international complications; and it seems to me that these are but the prelude to yet greater difficulties. The statesmen of the world are to-day called to face the greatest problems ever known, and it is with despair in their hearts that they meet from time to time in an endeavour to extricate themselves from that devastating monster called war.

As far as the world itself is concerned the entry into the new year is with much gloomy foreboding. Before many days have passed the present trend of things may become more apparent. The eyes of the whole world are rivetted on the Saar. What will be the outcome of the plebiscite? And how will the

nations of the world react to it? Which--ever way the matter goes someone will be edissatisfied. And national dissatisfaction

is a very grave matter.

Let us look in another direction. Soon Japan's two years' notice of leaving the League of Nations will have expired. Anticipating this event she has been working hard behind the scenes. She has made great plans for becoming a great naval power. Although her discussions with the other great naval powers have not taken the turn she hoped, she will undoubtedly carry out her programme. With her fortification of the mandatory islands of the Pacific and her plans for a huge submarine fleet she threatens the peace of the world in the East. Her warlike attitude has sent Russia hurrying into the League. aggressive move on the part of the former

against the latter would now be met by a united front on the part of the League. That is if there really is a League. For it seems to me that it is only a name

after all.

Behind high walls Russia works feverishly. She recently boasted that she has a large army. With her eyes furtively watching Japan she sees in her army and her enormous air force her only reply. She has no seaboard worthy of the name.

Another matter that is troubling the world is the re-arming of Germany. It seems that Germany has always been in the unfortunate position of a menace. Whatever this Teutonic race plans will be eyed with suspicion by the rest of the world. To-day is no exception. Her underground aerodromes and secret bombing planes are creating a stir in political circles, and the whole thing is watched with anxiety. Nations who have most cause to fear her are increasing their air forces to an alarming degree, and soon the sky will be dark with mechanical flight.

The great armaments race gets faster. Arsenals are working at highest pressure, while factories for the manufacture of ordinary commercial articles are being requisitioned by the governments for the production of death-dealing missiles. The defence is a subterfuge. There is no adequate defence against aerial bombardment.

Never before in the history of the world have there been so many pacts or alliances. They are an indication that men's hearts are failing them for fear. One cannot help wondering how many of these treaties

are scraps of paper.

The student of prophecy has not been taken by surprise by this sequence of events. Ever since the great upheaval of 1914 he has been scanning the horizon and has there seen the distant war-clouds. He has expected them for he stands with Bible in hand.

The passing of crowned heads since the Great War,

and the uprising of dictators, is not without significance. The world is passing through an apprenticeship. It is learning to choose its own leaders. One day it will choose a leader. Atheism and agnosticism are no longer mere opinions. They are organised forces that may amalgamate at any time under the leadership of Antichrist.

I am sometimes asked if the next war will be Armageddon. It is difficult to make an exact statement about what will be, but certainly the next war will not be Armageddon. Armageddon is a battle, not a war. It will be the climax of the last great And with things in their present condition it looks as though that war may start at any time. It may be long and protracted, or it may be short and decisive. In any case it will culminate in Armaged-The war itself may start in many

different parts of the world. Towards its close everything will converge on the valley of Megiddo for the final strife.

This then is the state of the world as we enter a new year. The nations of the world are hopelessly muddled, and everything is terribly involved. But the child of God has no cause to fear. He is surrounded by promises. The day is evil, but Jehovah reigns. While the world enters this new year with much trepidation the believer has a strong hope to which he clings. The unhappy events of to-day are the announcement of the advent of Christ.

Seeing these things what manner of men ought we to be? Let us as we enter this new year put ourselves once again on the altar. Let God have every bit of our lives. Let us live every minute for Him, and may every day find us using our every energy for the salvation of the lost that our God may be glorified.


bodies.

The following Sunday evening found the church filled to overflowing. Both church and minor hall were packed. Following the gospel message powerfully rendered in word and song, the loving invitation was again given out, and thirty-two hands were raised to signify their need and acceptance of the Christ. Men and women freed from the fetters of sin, delivered from spiritism and other devices of the Devil rejoiced in the knowledge of sins forgiven for:

In the open air meetings also fruit is being gathered for the Master. One man, when spoken to, was under deep conviction. A brother accompanied him to his home, and there, after prayer, both he and his wife entered into the joy of salvation. Before a gospel which can produce such definite results, prejudice and antagonism are slowly but surely giving way. The special baptismal service which was held recently, created much interest, the church being filled to its utmost capacity. The singing of the 23rd Psalm, beloved by all Scottish people, created a sympathetic atmosphere and prepared hearts for the searching message which followed. The singing of the hymn, "Jesus shall reign," brought the service to a close, but the blessing abides.

The following is a local press report of the above service:

Sunday evening, when, in the presence of a crowded congregation, eighteen converts were baptised.

The baptismal ceremony, which took place at the close of the ordinary service, was most impressive. The minister, Rev. S. Penney, in his baptismal robes, and standing almost waist-deep in water, received each convert in the white-tiled bath, which has been built immediately in front of the pulpit, and is to be a permanent structure in the church for use on future similar occasions.

With each succeeding day of the campaign, the tide of blessing rose higher. God's precious Word was revealed as a deep, deep mine containing jewels priceless and rare, and hearts and lives were spiritually enriched by the faithful and inspired exposition of the Scriptures.

One evening Pastor Thomas gave his testimony and furthermore delighted and interested his listeners which numbered about 700 by a graphic account of his experiences both at home and abroad. Although no gospel message was given, this personal ringing testimony of salvation was instrumental in bringing men and women to the foot of the Cross where fourteen accepted God's free offer of pardon.

The last meeting of the campaign was one never to be forgotten. The building was again packed to capacity, and it was indeed wonderful to gaze upon that sea of faces lit up by the radiance of His indwelling, and to hear hundreds of God's blood-bought children singing from the depths of their being the words of that beautiful hymn—

"Since I have been redeemed."

As they sang the power of God swept the meeting. The very rafters seemed to ring and re-echo the praises of God and the whole place became submerged in one grand tidal wave of glory. Pastor Thomas gave a stirring and heart-searching message based upon those striking words of Matthew xxvii. 22, "What shall I do then with Jesus which is called Christ?" Following the appeal twenty-four decisions were registered.

Pastor Carver of Swindon also paid a visit to the Church at Reading, a very profitable and enjoyable time being spent.


### PACKED HALL at anniversary services.

It was a pleasure and privilege to have in the chair Pastor E. J. Phillips. The service having commenced with a hymn of praise. Pastor J. C. Kennedy (the minister of the Church) became our supplicant at the throne of grace. We then listened with deep appreciation to the Letchworth Crusader Choir. These are the words which he wrote on the slate, "How shall we escape if we neglect so great salvation?" At the appointed time he himself explained the meaning of this gospel text and in so doing pointed out to his li-teners that whilst they may yet be detained within the precincts of those forbidding prison walls, they could enjoy the glorious liberty of the sons of God. This is but one of his many varied experiences. Yes! our dear brother is a true preacher, and we wish him God-speed in such a work. Mr. Pearson's testimony to the God-owned ministry of the London Crusader Choir

in its visitation to the various prisons received unanimous response from the great congregation.

My conviction that the service was definitely one of youth's adoration to God was further deepened by the singing by the Vanstone Trio of a beautiful piece entitled "All Hail to Thee, Immanuel."

If it be true that youth is best able to understand youth Evangelist David Vanstone, by virtue of the fact that the burden of time rests lightly upon his shoulders was most fitted to be our closing speaker. His was a practical word—a timely word. He did not indulge in wild platitudes, but inculcated into us all the determination to leave far behind us the dreamy, misty realm of the idealist, that we might become men and women of purpose. His message befitted the occasion and was a worthy climax to a service which had given us a lift heavenward.

#### Visit of Famous Choir to Woolwich Elim London Crusader Choir at the Town Hall

Preceding the service from 7 p.m. to 7.30 p.m. an organ recital was given by Mr. Prentice, a member of the choir; also a trumpet and trombone solo by two other members. This recital was enjoyed by all.

Apart from the ministry of song as given by the choir, a recitation was splendidly rendered by a young lady member of the choir, Miss I. Gale. A splendid testimony was given by another Crusadersister. The lady members of the choir also gave a selection "Come," a song that was much appreciated by a responsive crowd of people.

The special speaker for the evening was Pastor W. G. Hathaway (field superintendent), who, in his own inimitable way, arrested the attention of all as he ably discoursed on the ever-interesting subject, "Revival." ### THE PRINCE IMPERIAL'S DEATH

HE late Prince Imperial of France lost his life in the Zulu campaign. It would appear that he had been sent out with a party to a deserted Zulu fort. "Let us return," said one of the officers. "If we don't return immediately we may be killed by the Zulus." "No fear of that," said the Prince Imperial: "let us have a cup of coffee and start in ten minutes." Before the "ten minutes" had expired a band of Zulus pounced upon them, and among those that fell dead was the young Prince.

When the ex-Empress Eugenie heard of his procrastination on that fatal night she said: "That was his great failing from his earliest days. He never wanted to go to bed at night in time, nor to rise in the morning. When too sleepy to speak he would lift up his little hands and spread out his ten fat fingers, indicating that he wanted 'ten minutes' more. On this account I often laughed at my baby boy, and called him 'Little Mr. Ten Minutes.'"

The sin of procrastination is ruining millions of souls. The unsaved reader intends to be saved sometime. You have not the slightest thought or intention of being eternally lost. You purpose accepting Christ as your Saviour sometime. In the meantime, however, you delay doing so. At another time you will close with God's offered mercy. Every moment that you delay you increase

your guilt. God commands you to repent and believe His glorious gospel as you read these lines. " Now is the accepted time." So long as you do not accept of this "unspeakable gift," under whatever pious pretence, you are making God a liar. " He that believeth not God hath made Him a liar, because he believeth not the record that God gave of His Son: and this is the record, that God hath given to us eternal life, and this life is in His Son" (I. John v. 10, 11). What a horrid sin to make the Almighty and Eternal God a liar! Yet this is what every procrastinator is doing. So long as you are unsaved you are an unbeliever; and so long as you don't believe on the Lord Jesus the wrath of God abideth on you. "He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life; and He that believeth not the Son of God shall not see life, but the wrath of God abideth on him" (John iii. 36). "How long halt ye between two opinions?" Don't put off the settling of this all-important question even for ten minutes. The ten minutes' delay cost the Prince Imperial of France his life, and ten minutes' procrastination may cause you the loss of your soul. You may be in eternity before to-morrow's sun rises! The Lord Jesus may come at this very moment and take His Church to Himself. Then, O awful thought! you will be left behind to pass through the awful judgments that are going to be inflicted on Christ-neglecting souls.
