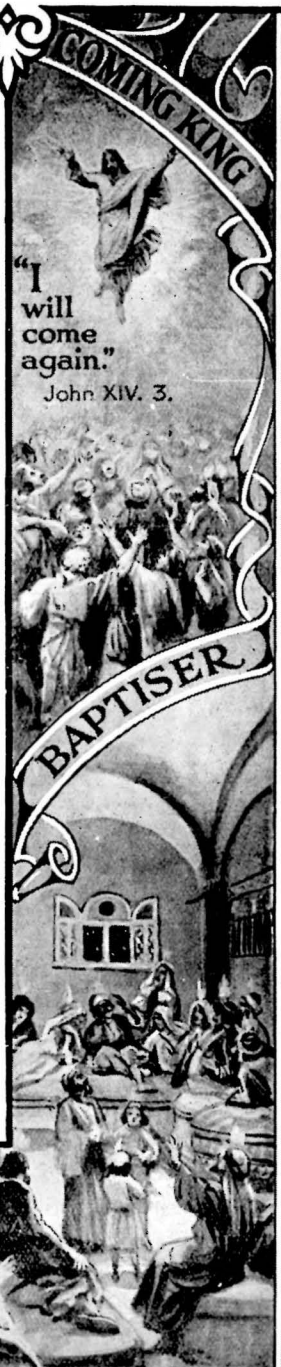

Armistice Day Reflections

THE month of November brings Armistice Day. The two minutes' silence this year will be deepened by the fact that war clouds are hanging over us once again. The 11th of November is a very sad day for those who had the misfortune to pass through the years of the Great War. It is a day bringing sad and solemn memories. Many weeping eyes and sorrowful expressions will be seen in our land. Some have thought that this is one reason why Armistice Day should not be held. Do our loved ones who made the great sacrifice desire this yearly remembrance which brings so much heart sorrow and grief? Yet on the other hand it is one way of showing our great appreciation of their sacrifice for us.

The price of war is indeed lamentable and tragic. The Great War that raged between 1914 and 1918 had a comparatively small beginning, the murder of one man, yet this developed into the greatest war in human history; it became world-wide. Britain's sacrifice was a total of 908,371 killed and 2,090,212 wounded. At Ypres 160,600, were killed, at Armentieres 28,128, at Mons where it is reported that the angels of the Lord appeared over No-Man's-Land, 36,230 were killed and 123,448 wounded, at the battle of the Somme 111,150 were slaughtered. Shot, shell, bayonet and poisonous gas sent

MILLIONS INTO ETERNITY.

Kipling pictures a battle scene when he says:—

" You may hide in the caves, they'll be only your graves,
But you can't get away from the guns."

Thirty million human lives were sacrificed. There remains a colossal army of the maimed that cannot be numbered.

After the Great War we were told that the world would be a place fit for heroes to live in—a war to end wars. That is a prophecy that has never been fulfilled. The warring spirit has been manifested more than ever in the last decade. The world is heading for a black midnight. We are heading for the abyss. We are on the brink of another world-wide conflict. Nation is rising up against nation and kingdom against kingdom. Since the Armistice was signed in 1918 the barbarism of war has developed amazingly. A world

crisis is imminent. The world is experiencing a period of depression unequalled in modern history. There is a widespread distress and perplexity. It is a sign of the last days (II. Tim. iii. 1). It will end in a climax, known as Armageddon.

I wonder do we ever think what the next war will be like? We have only to read our daily newspapers to get a vivid idea. It appears it will be chiefly an air-war. One statesman says that: " Next time,

IMMEDIATELY WAR IS DECLARED,

the commander-in-chief of the enemy nation will press a button, and 20,000—perhaps 50,000 aeroplanes, laden with bombs and gas, will rise into the air and set off at more than 200 miles an hour to rain destruction on this country."

Mussolini is stated to have declared that he will not be satisfied until the wings of his aeroplanes blot out the light of the sun. Also every powerful nation has doubled its air force during the last five years. Reader, ponder the significance of this.

Not only is there air war but economic war too. Nations are desperate. This is a very real and deadly conflict. There is much stagnation in trade and industry. Millions are unemployed. Poverty is rampant. One authority says that war is the only way to alleviate these economic conditions. Mussolini says, " Italy must either expand or explode." Italy dreams of territorial expansion in Africa as a means of deliverance from economic pressure. It seems that there are far too many of us on this planet, and the only outlet for overcrowded populations is war. The tragic thing is that those who expound this method do not desire to belong to the surplus population. Those who advocate war are generally those who find some position of security.

Again

THERE IS FINANCIAL WAR.

There seems to be no way out. The world is full of nerves. The situation in Germany is precarious. Russia's " Five Year Plan " has miserably failed. France's position is critical. U.S.A. is floundering in the mire. Great Britain manages to keep afloat by strategy, and, I believe, Divine leading.

There is the war against true religion too. A spirit of evil is battling against God. Materialism and infidelity is in conflict against revealed truth. Men and women do not want to have time to think about eternal things, about holiness, about God and death. We live in an age of speed and pleasure. False doctrines are rampant, identified in Spiritism, Mormonism and Russellism. The battle against revealed truth is to me the greatest of all dangers. Fighting seems to be the natural instinct of man, and doubtless this is the real obstacle to universal peace.

Reader, what is your attitude toward this warfare?

The Italo-Abyssinian situation is very critical. War is devilish. War is grotesque. War is sinful. It should be strongly deprecated and tenaciously denounced. War is contrary to the teaching of Christ. The human law says hate your enemy. The divine law says, "Love your enemies."

"He maketh wars to cease." Christ's return will save humanity and civilisation. The earthward look is very disheartening but the uplook is glorious. "The coming of the Lord draweth nigh." There is only one ray of hope and that is the Lord's near return. Hallelujah! The Lord God omnipotent reigneth!

OUR PARLIAMENT

In view of the coming election it is interesting to read that the *Methodist Times and Leader* says: "If you brush aside the superficial you will find the greatest party in Parliament to-day will assemble under the shadow of the Cross."

Such a statement is good, yet it should also be remembered that many will gather under the shadow of the Cross who have not experienced the new birth.

BIBLE SOCIETY FIGURES

The British and Foreign Bible Society, which since its foundation has published altogether 464,000,000 copies of the Scriptures, distributed 10,970,609 during the last twelve months. A surplus of £2,680 is reported on the year's working.

Publication is now being carried on in 692 languages as compared with 424 in 1910, 14 new languages being added last year. Of these, 142 are for peoples of the British Commonwealth.

PENTECOSTAL BLESSING

It is always a pleasure to note the truly Pentecostal experiences that some members of the Worldwide Evangelisation Crusade (founded by Mr. C. T. Studd) experience. Miss Emma Munn, a missionary bound for Spanish Guinea is an illustration.

SAVED AND SANCTIFIED

Miss Munn says: "I wasn't born of Christian parents, but although my father was ungodly, my mother always sent us to Church and Sunday school every Sunday. At the age of twelve I entered a linen mill as a half-timer, working one day and at school the next. Two years later I left school and was full-time in the mill. I then began to taste the pleasures of the world; going in for theatres, pictures, etc., until at eighteen, God met me and wonderfully saved me. Some considerable time later God revealed to me that He could not only save, but sanctify me wholly, and again I trusted Him by faith to do a second work of grace in my heart.

HEALING

Miss Munn continues, "I reached twenty-one, but the way did not open up, I took rheumatic fever and was confined to bed for some months, also keratitis in my eyes, having to wear dark glasses for twelve months. Everything seemed against me, yet withal God was always saying, 'Other sheep I have which are not of this fold, them also I must bring.' Then I went to a Faith meeting in a Church of England and claimed divine healing. God loosened my joints and touched my eyes and completely healed me, Hallelujah!"

RUSSIA'S BIRTH-RATE

In view of Russia's position in prophecy the increase in her birthrate is specially interesting and amazing:

Russia's population increase last year reached the remarkable figure of 4,500,000—the highest annual gain in the history of the country.

A vigorous Press campaign, inspired by the Kremlin, has evidently encouraged young Russians to marry and raise families.

"By all means get married. Family life makes living brighter, fuller and more colourful," was the advice broadcast by the Soviet leaders.

The increase in the birth rate has been stimulated by the rising standard of living; by the State regulation which gives all women employees a month's holiday, with pay, before and after childbirth; and by the new decrees to deal with alimony evasion.

THE FIGHT IS ON

The fight for religious freedom is indeed "on" in Germany.

Hitler has decided to use the iron fist to suppress the

revolt of the German Protestant pastors against Nazi doctrines.

He has issued a decree appointing Herr Kerrl, Minister for Church Affairs, as dictator of the German Evangelical Church with full power to issue decrees, against which there is no appeal.

The new law making Herr Kerrl dictator is Hitler's answer to the "no compromise" attitude taken up by the Confessional (Opposition) Church in Prussia.

At a Synod of this body, which ended at one o'clock yesterday morning in Dahlem, Berlin, resolutions were passed insisting that the Church must retain its right to preach the Gospel unfettered and that Jews must not be excluded from its message.

It was further declared that the Church must retain its God-given right to baptise Jews should they wish to embrace Christianity.

We do not know much about this Confessional Church, but we are in full agreement that the Jew must not be excluded from the Gospel message.

Conference Cogitations

By An ELIM MINISTER

A LONG room with high ceiling, windows overlooking rambling grounds, where falling leaves and empty flower-beds disclose the fact that it is early winter. The room is packed with Elim Ministers and their wives and Elim workers.

Warmhearted loving greetings have already been exchanged, for many gathered together have not met since last Conference, over twelve months ago. The crowded room of loyal-hearted lovers of Jesus is filled with throbbing expectancy. The atmosphere is vibrant with Holy Ghost power.

Principal Jeffreys takes his seat as Chairman of the Conference, behind a little table, with Pastor E. J. Phillips, Secretary-General for the Elim Work, and the members of the Executive Council sitting close at hand. The Principal gives out the hymn, "Blest be the tie that binds our hearts in Christian love." Those assembled rise to their feet, and the dear familiar words ring forth verse after verse with increased fervour and earnest devotion. Then the Principal reads with solemn tones from God's Word, commencing at I. Corinthians xii. 27, "Now ye are the body of Christ and members in particular"—reading right on through the 13th chapter to the end. The meeting is thrown open for prayer, and loving hearts bursting with desire for God's highest, for every session in the Conference pours out its petitions and its praise. The meeting is lifted higher and higher under the anointing of the Spirit as prayer follows prayer. A lull, then the ministry through the gifts of the Holy Ghost follows, and God through tongues and interpretation speaks words of encouragement and exhortation to the members of the Conference. Prayer and worship quietly draw to a close and the business of Conference begins with solemn deliberations and free, spontaneous exchange of views, interspersed with happy, brotherly criticism.

The morning worship day after day will hold sacred and solemn memories for all, when the longings and

desires of consecrated lives were outpoured under Holy Ghost anointings in prayer and praise with the ministry of the gifts of the Spirit often in operation. It can be truthfully and joyously stated that when problems rose for discussion during Conference that savoured of "the thin edge of the wedge" on the side of compromise or lowering the standard the members of Conference threw it overboard and every time reached forth for that which was highest for God and His kingdom.

It was a marked feature of the Conference that the Ministers in their discussions and deliberations had always in mind the thought of that which was best for the people of their flock. Often they made unselfish decisions involving sometimes more labour and responsibility for themselves in order better to meet the need of their people. The note struck for holiness, uttermost separation, and sanctification was a unanimous one all the way through, and the desire of the Ministers for a full floodtide Pentecost in their Churches, and for a great national Holy Ghost revival was also wholehearted and impressive in its intensity.

The Conference ended with a service in Kensington Temple on the Friday night for the ordination of Ministers. It was a service long to be remembered, not only by those who were so solemnly set apart for the work of the ministry by the laying on of hands according to sacred Scriptures, but also by every person present in that crowded gathering. Right from the beginning, when the Principal opened the meeting with the beautiful new Conference chorus, a mighty and sacred anointing held the meeting under its sway, until the end when Principal Jeffreys, by his wonderfully unique and God-given gift, closed the meeting with that remarkable degree of deep devotion and Holy Ghost worship that so often is characteristic of the closing moments of his meetings.

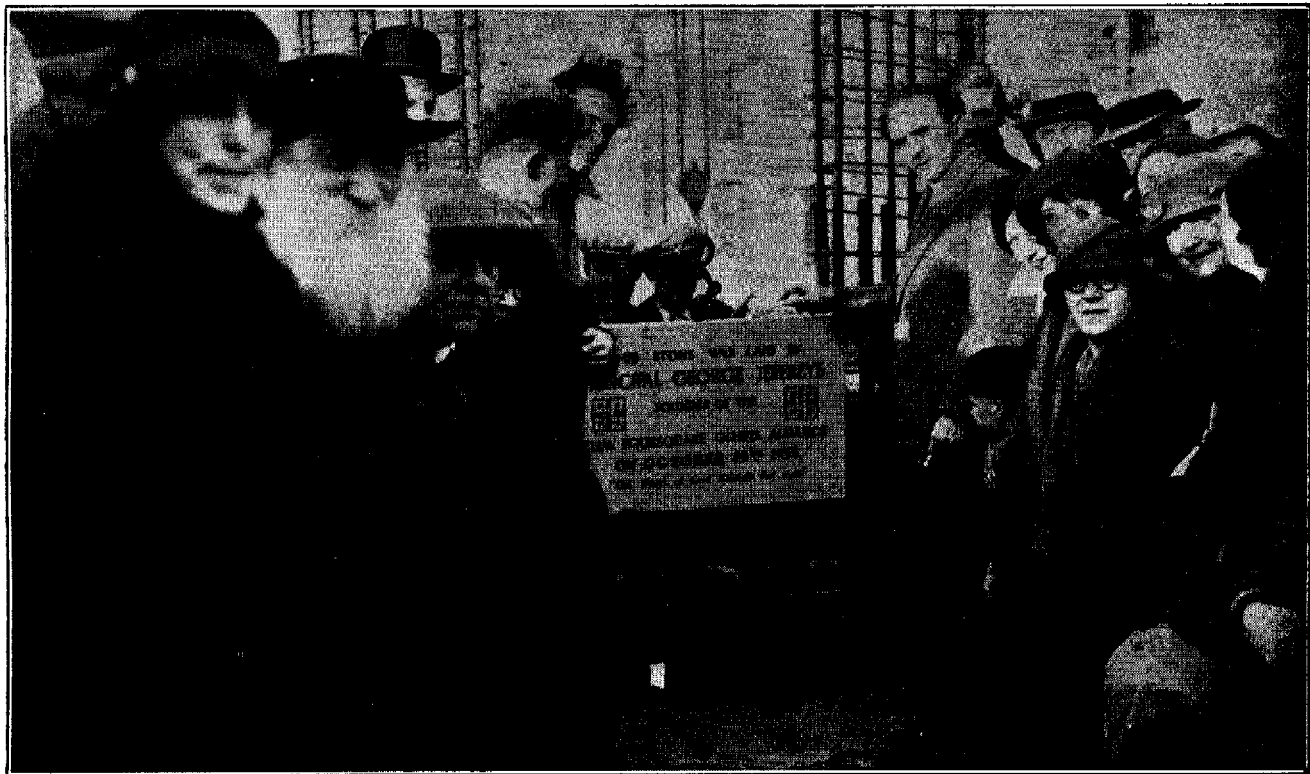

PAUL'S TESTIMONY TO THE GOSPEL OF CHRIST IN ROMANS

1. I am not ashamed of it (i. 16).
2. I have fully preached it (xv. 19).
3. I am full of the blessing of it (xv. 29).

CHRIST

Christ was born in a manger (Luke ii. 7), which brought great joy to all people (Luke ii. 10). The heavenly choir sings! No wonder!

He was honoured by shepherds and the Wise Men. They sought; they found; they worshipped; they brought gifts; they testified; they glorified God (Matt. ii; Luke ii).

Remember Christmas is Christ's birthday. Do not hide the Christ! Do not bury Him under an avalanche of commercialism! Christmas is His day! Make it known with no uncertain sound!

Is He pleased with the honour He receives? There are wonderful pictures of Christ; great books about Christ; artist and author praised. There are beautiful churches and cathedrals in which to worship Christ; we talk of the buildings; great preachers exalt Jesus; man is honoured. Wonderful choirs sing of Him; the choir is praised. Is Jesus pleased? Is He honoured? "Where is Mine honour?" (Mal. i. 6).

Satisfy Him! Make His heart glad! Make room for Him; take Him in; give Him a warm welcome; draw near to Him; love Him; praise Him; magnify Him. Gifts alone will never satisfy the heart of love, human or divine.

Trust Him for salvation. It is the only way to really gladden His heart. Unless He is our Saviour, He has a very small place in our hearts. He was born a Saviour (Luke ii. 11). When saved, we are in the centre of His will. He is pleased and we are for ever satisfied.

Sunday, November 17th. Exod. xxxv. 20-29.

"An offering of gold unto the Lord" (verse 22).

What a privilege to make an offering unto the Lord. And yet how often our offerings are mixed with the alloy of selfish motive which mar their beauty and lessen their value. We bring to the Lord that which bears the blemish of selfish interest: mingled with our oblation is the desire for personal glory and gain. He demands and deserves our best and utmost; less than this is unworthy of those who have been redeemed at the infinite cost of His precious blood. O Master Divine, grant that I may lay upon Thy altar the sacrifices of a pure heart and a contrite spirit: that in my worship I may yield Thee all that Thy heart seeks in me; that from the sanctuary within may flow a constant stream of adoration and obedience.

PRAYER TOPIC:

For God's special blessing on the campaign commencing to-day at Swindon, conducted by Pastor J. Woodhead.

Monday, November 18th. Exod. xxxiv. 30-35 and xxxvi. 1-7.

"The people bring much more than enough for the service of the work" (verse 5).

Israel were experiencing a great wave of willingness to give; the urge was within them to bestow their belongings in abundance upon the Lord. So great was the spirit of liberality that restraint became necessary, and further gifts had to be forbidden. Seldom does the Church of God realise such a baptism of beneficence; rarely does the treasury overflow with a fulness which more than meets her needs. Yet God would fain teach His people the true secret of giving, so that their lives might be enriched and enlarged. Blessed are those hearts which pour their wealth upon other needy souls, and lavish their spiritual fulness upon the Lord Himself. The withered soul is the one that withholds; the wealthy soul is the one that scatters its treasures.

PRAYER TOPIC:

For Mrs. Thomas (Spain) that following her recent illness she may be completely restored and re-invigorated by life divine.

Tuesday, November 19th. Exod. xl. 17-27.

"And he brought the ark into the tabernacle" (verse 21).

That symbolical ark meant the indwelling of the Divine presence and glory. Everything within the tabernacle borrowed its beauty from that central splendour. Alas, we may often find the tabernacle without the ark; ornate ritual, costly ceremonial and elaborate sanctuary, but no ark within to denote the

presence of the Lord. My life may possess many natural charms, and be externally correct, yet if it lacks the ark of the divine glory, it is deprived of its greatest and most vital attraction. Blessed Lord, I beseech Thee to make this life of mine beautiful to Thee. Let it bear an inward spiritual splendour that shall transfigure its plainness, and render it a joy to Thee and Thine.

PRAYER TOPIC:

That increased numbers may join Elim Bible College Correspondence School, to probe more deeply into the treasured storehouse of God's Word.

Wednesday, November 20th. Exod. xl. 28-38.

"So Moses finished the work" (verse 33).

This was the reward of faithfulness in service. From the hour in which God had disclosed to His servant the detailed plan of the tabernacle Moses had devoted himself to the execution of this work. And now he had the satisfaction of completion; the vision had taken material form; the inspired thought had been transformed into the tabernacle. How much unfinished effort stands to rebuke those who have put their hands to the task for a season, but who in the moment of test have failed in their appointed ministry. Blessed are those who like Moses have persevered unto the end, until God's purpose is achieved in them, and all His rich plan finds expression in their lives.

PRAYER TOPIC:

Praise for Bristol's time of Holy Ghost visitation and blessing through the Principal's campaign.

Thursday, November 21st. I. Pet. i. 1-12.

"Though now for a season, . . . ye are in heaviness" (verse 6).

The light affliction is "but for a moment," the exceeding weight of glory is eternal. The heaviness is temporary, like a passing cloud it may veil the face of the sun for a moment, but anon the sun shall shine with even greater brilliance than before. It is only a little while that we are called to suffer the burden of heaviness; to-morrow we shall emerge into the larger place in the plan of God. It is the weight of the cross that generates strength to reign in union with Christ. We are never more in fellowship with the Master than when we tread the Via Dolorosa of suffering and shame. His hand is within our trembling grasp, and we may bravely face the oncoming moments of this day.

PRAYER TOPIC:

For divine grace and wisdom for Miss Ewens in India as she takes over Miss Brown's work at Giridih.

Friday, November 22nd. I. Pet. i. 13-25.

"Being born again" (verse 23).

What a glorious revelation and realisation these words bring. A new creation in Christ Jesus. Made partakers of the Divine Nature. Separated from the past by the crisis of a new birth. Born into an enduring relationship which offers unlimited privilege and possibility. What a day this must be for the soul that spends it in the enjoyment of that fellowship which this new life makes possible. Sonship! And sonship in the family of God. Within my soul is created the filial cry "Father." And this means access. Once far off but now "made nigh." O the wonder, the rapture which this blood-bought relationship brings to my heart. Grant that I may bear Thy image in this mortal body so that others may see Thy likeness written large therein.

PRAYER TOPIC:

That's God's signal blessing may rest upon every Crusader Rally held during these coming winter months.

Saturday, November 23rd. I. Pet. ii. 1-12.

"Desire . . . the Word, that ye may grow thereby" (verse 2).

We are born to grow. Some seem to assume that birth and maturity are identical, yet experience confirms the Word of God here. Growth is dependent upon healthy spiritual appetite and nutritious food. Believers who seek to promote their Christian life by any other method than that prescribed by God Himself may well meet with mortifying disappointment. It is only by believing and obeying the Word that we may develop real Christian character. Crisis will only reveal the weakness of those who feed upon other substitutes for the revelation of God. Help me day by day to feast upon Thy living truth, O Lord! Make Thou this heart to hunger continually for that which alone can build up my inner life. THE Annual Ministerial and General Conferences of the Elim Foursquare Gospel Alliance were held at the Elim Bible College, Clapham Park, London, from Monday to Friday, 21st to 25th October, 1935. There was a goodly company of Ministers present from all parts of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and our beloved leader, Principal George Jeffreys was again in the chair.

A subject which occupied almost two complete sessions was

THE GIFTS OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

Many of the difficulties experienced in our Churches in the exercise particularly of the gifts of tongues, interpretation, and prophecy were discussed, and helpful suggestions were made. It was accepted that as these gifts are primarily for the Church, their use should be practically confined to meetings of believers and definitely discouraged at Gospel and Preaching Services. As regards the Communion Service, while the manifestation of the gifts during the time of worship was to be encouraged, it was felt that during the

A Week of Deliberation

partaking of the emblems it often had the effect of diverting attention from the real purpose of the service.

The necessity of judging the gifts was stressed, and that there should be no liberty week after week for manifestations which fail to bring blessing to the people of God. All those present testified that they stood for the exercise of the gifts of the Spirit in our Churches, and the need for maintaining the Pentecostal testimony was emphasised.

Another matter which claimed two sessions for its discussion was

THE CHRISTIAN'S ATTITUDE TO WAR

The importance of this matter in view of the times in which we live scarcely needs emphasis. Students of all schools of prophecy warn us that wars are inevit-

able, and the League of Nations has certainly proved itself incapable of averting it. But what is to be the attitude of the believer? Several hours were spent in listening to speakers on both sides of the question and in carefully considering the scriptures which bear on this subject, and the following resolution was proposed and carried:—

“That while this General Conference of the Elim Foursquare Gospel Alliance affirms its loyalty to His Majesty the King and to the government of our land, it believes that the Church of Jesus Christ which is called out from the world to preach the Gospel of salvation and peace to all men is based on spiritual principles which are incompatible with the Christian's participation in war. It considers, however, that this is

a matter which every believer should settle for himself in the light of the Word of God.”

A question of particular interest to young people—

THE CHRISTIAN'S ATTITUDE TO RECREATION

—provoked a most helpful discussion. While the need of healthy recreation for those who spend most of their time in factories, offices, or other indoor employment was recognised, the effect of organised sport on the spiritual life of the believer was considered. It was generally agreed that the dangers to be guarded against in connection with any form of games or sport were (i) time being used which could more profitably be spent, (ii) a keen interest in the game leading to attending matches in order to improve one's playing, and (iii) taking part in games with unbelievers. The Conference definitely expressed its disapproval of regular organised sport in connection with our movement. The possibilities of combining physical exercise with active service for the Master in village open air work, tract distribution, etc., were emphasised.

Armistice Day.

SEVENTEEN years ago, after over four years of terrible tragedy, the order to cease fire was given, and men sheathed their swords and once more turned their faces in hopeful expectation towards the sunrise of peace. The nightmare of 1914-1918 was o'er and hearts were stirred with the promise and possibility of a new era from which war might be banished. We wonder whether that vision of peace is growing dim in some circles in these days. Amid all the agitating influences that are abroad in the world to-day, influences that make for strife, how much we need to keep that vision of peace bright and clear within our hearts. To foster it and cherish it in every possible way. To pray for it—live for it—labour for it—sacrifice for it, and if needs be die for it. Surely Armistice Day should be a time of re-dedication to the principles of peace—of repudiation of all that tends to provoke or promote war. A time when a fresh affirmation of our allegiance to Him who is the Prince of Peace should be made.

The General Election.

ENGLAND is on the eve of a General Election; in a few days the country will be choosing its parliamentary representatives at Westminster, and determining the political character of its future Government. A tremendous responsibility is thus resting upon those who vote, especially in times of crisis such as these. So much is at stake. If ever the ship of state needed a wise and steady hand upon the helm of affairs it is to-day. She is passing through perilous waters, and requires the guidance of experienced statesmen. We believe that the Christian Church should take a prayerful interest in an event of such national importance. It would be well for all believers to intercede at such a time that whatever the political issue, the result of the Election may help to bring the nation into closer union with the purpose and plan of God. Even in the realm of politics prayer may prove a potent force.

If you aspire to be a son of consolation; if you would partake of the priestly gift of sympathy; if you would pour something beyond commonplace consolation into a tempted heart; if you would pass through the intercourse of daily life with the delicate tact that never inflicts pain; you must be content to pay the price of a costly education—like Him, you must suffer.

The binding is of strong cloth boards and gilt stamped, making a handsome book at a remarkably low price. Cruden's concordance was used by D. L. A unique feature of the week was "Advertisement night" when several Crusaders drew spiritual lessons from different commodities advertised in various ways.

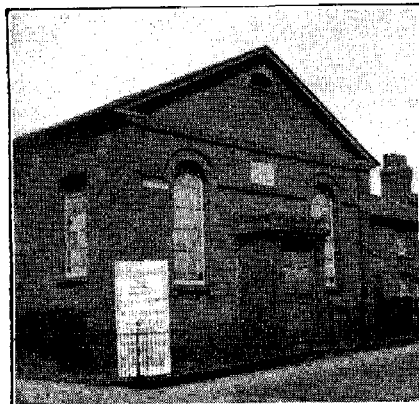

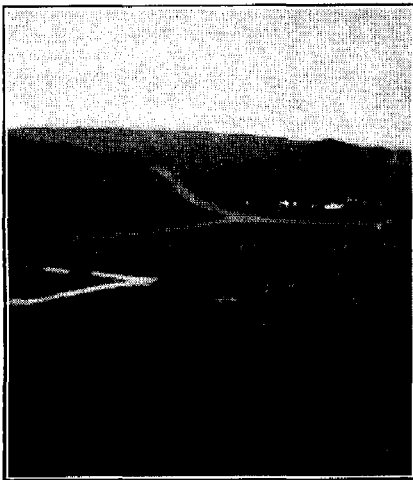

Can a Man be Saved in the Street?

MANY years ago Alexander was a young man residing near the famous Cloch Lighthouse. He had tried to find satisfaction in the things of Time, and like all who have tried, he found they were utterly helpless in meeting the longings of the human heart or satisfying the cravings of the soul.

His hopes were raised by the coming of Brownlow North, the profligate whom God saved and used to the conversion of many sinners in Scotland. At one of the services held in the town of Greenock the Holy Spirit used the message to the conviction of Alexander. He saw himself to be included in the "All have sinned and come short of the glory of God" of Romans iii. 23. He knew that "the wages of sin is death" (Rom. vi. 23), and he realised that as a sinner unprepared to meet a Holy God he was in danger of everlasting woe. Mr. North intimated that anyone desiring a personal interview concerning the Way of Salvation could call upon him at the house in which he stayed. Here was an opportunity for Alexander. Should he go or should he not go? One voice said, "Go and get the great question settled." Another voice said, "It is no use, the impression will pass away in a little while, and nothing will remain; do not trouble about it." At last the voice of prudence prevailed, and Alexander was found at the door of the house—halting, wondering if he should enter. The voice of urgency controlled; he rang the bell, and was ushered into the room where the famous evangelist was sitting.

Mr. North opened up to the young man the Scriptures concerning the utter ruin of man, the glorious remedy

provided through the atoning work of the Lord Jesus Christ, how that though "All we, like sheep, have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way," yet the glad and glorious Gospel message declares that "the Lord hath laid on Him the iniquity of us all" (Isa. liii. 6). He also urged the responsibility of the sinner to personally and promptly accept the Lord Jesus Christ as his own Saviour, concluding by quietly quoting the Master's own words, "Be not afraid, only believe" (Mark v. 36).

The interview closed, the anxious soul left the room undecided, the way of salvation seemed more difficult than ever. Passing along Union Street he kept repeating to himself the words, "Be not afraid, only believe;" "Be not afraid, only believe." Suddenly, while standing in the street, the light burst in upon his darkened soul; the way of Salvation was revealed in the power of the Holy Ghost. He was a sinner utterly unable to do anything to save himself; God had loved him and given His Son to die for the ungodly, the Sacrifice had been accepted, the Victim of Calvary had become the Victor of Glory, the Scriptures emphatically stated that, "If thou shalt confess with thy mouth Jesus as Lord, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised Him from the dead, thou shalt be saved" (Rom. x. 9). Alexander believed, and was saved on the spot in the Greenock street.

The writer has observed his consistent Christian testimony for thirty years, and heard him relate the substance of this testimony in his happy old age. "Be not afraid, only believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved." Test it and find it true.

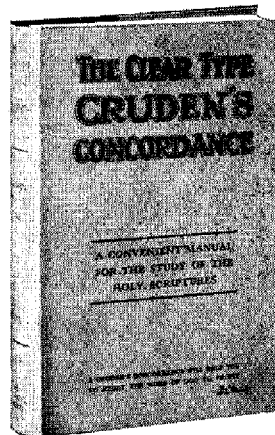
