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

# The Duty of Winsomeness

# A DEVOTIONAL STUDY

T is very important to cultivate a happy and cheerful heart. It is a matter of cultivation; we cannot afford, as Christians, to abandon ourselves to our moods. There are times with all of us when we feel depressed and sad for no special reason, except that a mood is on us; it is at such times that we need to anoint our heads and wash our faces, that we be not consumed by our fretfulness or impose it on others.

A little boy who was peevish and fretful complained to his mother that all his schoolmates were disagreeable to him. She took him into the fields and walked to a place where there was a loud echo among the rocks. Then she began to shout angrily at the rocks, and of course, there came back angry echoes. Next, she sang and laughed, and back came the musical and joyous echoes. "You hear, my child," said she, "that just as I address the rock it answers me back." Now, try to remember this all your life. As you speak to the world, the world will answer you back. If you are kind, others will be kind to you, if you are disagreeable,

## OTHERS WILL ACT ACCORDINGLY

in return."

There is an Italian proverb which says that "more flies are caught with honey than with vinegar." So with you and me, if we are to win others for Christ, we must show to the world the sweet and cheerful side of our lives, and not the sour and sorrowful side. Putting on a cheerful courage, arraying ourselves in the garments of joy, and anointing ourselves with the spirit of praise, we may go forth to shed sunbeams rather than shadows upon the path of life. Do not nurse your sorrow of heart, lest your spirit and the spirit of others be broken.

We can promote a cheerful heart by dwelling on the bright side of our lot, by counting up the mercies which are left, rather than dwelling on the ones which are gone; by believing that there is a reason and a loving Providence in every incident of life, by compelling ourselves thither to ascend and dwell, where

Jesus has gone before us; and when the heart is full of the light and the love of God, can it be other than cheerful? It has

### A CONTINUAL FEAST,

because its meat and drink is to do the will of God. Then the face shines with the reflection of the inner light, and those with whom we come in contact say: "In him there is a lighting up." To be winsome, to attract, to fascinate, to charm, we must be in living union with Christ, the Light of the World. In Jesus there is an infinitude of supply of peace and joy, sunshine and light.

What was it which seemed to constrain the masses of the people to flock everywhere to Jesus? Wherever He went the people heard Him gladly. He was the heavenly soul-winner, and His apostles caught from Him the winsome spirit. He never scolded or rebuked the weak and guilty, but only the hypocritical, the self-righteous, the tyrannical, the robbers of widows and orphans, the oppressors of the poor. Winsomeness implies strength, in that we win the confidence of others and are trusted in, because we are "strong in the strength of the Lord." Winsomeness implies sweetness. To win souls for God, we must put forth some inducements that will draw.

# A SMILE MAY WIN.

Kind words have wonderful influence. A gracious demeanour and a loving manner must tell on many who would otherwise remain alienated. It implies light. During darkness all is cold and cheerless, black and terrible, to nervous souls and timid children. The birds cease their songs. The flowers close their petals in many cases. But when light irradiates the scene the world awakens, the music of the groves pours forth, the flowers look up. So, if we scatter the gospel light in our character, we shall create music and pleasure around us. Paul says we are to "please men for good to edification." This is a very beautiful injunction. We cannot do people much good if we displease them. The art of pleasing is, of course, the

art of giving pleasure. A winsome life is one long and eloquent sermon. It is not just isolated and spasmodic acts that constitute winsomeness, but a continued manifestation of true Christian character. Winsomeness is a real ornament, the most beautiful dress a man or woman can wear and worth more as a means of winning favour than the finest jewels. Let us, therefore.

AS CHRISTIANS PUT ON MERCY,

kindness, humbleness of mind, meekness, longsuffering, every morning of our lives, thus dressing our souls as we dress our bodies, and forbearing one another,

and forgiving one another. "Even as Christ forgave you, so also do ye."

"I expect to pass through this life but once; if, therefore, there be any kindness I can show or any good thing I can do to my fellow-human beings, let me do it now; let me not defer nor neglect it, for I shall not pass this way again."

"Forgive and forget! 'tis a lesson worth more
Than all that was taught by the sages of yore;
Forgive! that forgiveness to error we've shown,
Perchance we may yet have to claim for our own.
If the world doth thee wrong, oh, revenge it not yet,
For man is thy brother—Forgive and Forget!"

# The Book of Life

A GOOD title for the Bible would be "The Book of Life." It begins and ends with Life. In the first chapter of Genesis God is seen creating life, vegetable, animal, human and spiritual.

In the second chapter is seen the Tree of Life in the midst of the Paradise, and in the last chapter of the whole Bible (Rev. xxii.) the whole earth has become the Paradise of God. For as John says, "The angel shewed me a river of the water of life as clear as crystal, issuing from the throne of God and of the Lamb" (Rev. xxii. 1).

The new earth has now become the Garden of Eden of God, for "The Tabernacle of God is set up among

men " (Rev. xxi. 3, XXth Cent. N.T.).

Again therefore we see not only "the river that went out of Eden to water the garden," but also: "On each side of the river was a tree of life which bore

## TWELVE KINDS OF FRUIT,

yielding its fruit each month; and the leaves of the tree were for the healing of the nations" (Rev. xxii. 2).

And not only does the Bible begin and end with life, but its whole theme is life—life given, life lost and life restored. For the promise of the Law, the Prophets, the Psalms and the Gospel is all one and that is of life.

And with the promise of life is included every blessing that heart can wish for. The word itself denotes, in the originals, every kind of enjoyment and satisfaction. To the first Adam this life was granted as a free gift, when God breathed into his nostrils the breath of lives (Nishmath-Khayyim).

He was destined to live for ever, for even to his body this life was imparted—in one way only could it be forfeited, and that was by eating of the tree of knowledge. In this way Eve and Adam

their right to life, as it was said to them: "In the day that thou eatest thereof, dying thou shalt die."

The zoe or spiritual life was immediately forfeited, and the natural life (psuche) alone remained to them.

The Lord Himself sums up His mission in one pregnant sentence: "I am come that they might have life and that they might have it more abundantly." He said: "I am the bread of life which cometh down from heaven and giveth life to the world." "I am the

Resurrection and the Life." He is the Source of all life, natural and spiritual: "That which came into being in Him was life" (John i. 4, XXth Cent. N.T.).

All the time of His earthly ministry was spent in imparting life to spirit, soul and body. And finally: "He gave His life a ransom for all." "By the grace of God, He tasted death for every man." "He bore our sins in His own body on the tree." But on His way to the Cross, He also

## BORE OUR SICKNESSES

and carried away our pains (Isaiah liii. 4, Heb.). "Himself took our infirmities and bare our diseases" (Matt. viii. 17) in order that we might not have to bear them. And when on earth He healed every disease and every sickness, that this promise might be fulfilled. On the Cross He became a curse for us, for it is written, "Cursed is every one that hangs on a tree." The curse of the Law included every kind of sickness, but "Christ has redeemed us from the curse of the Law."

Plainly therefore, He has redeemed us from every kind of sickness. Well may we sing—

O Christ, how Thou hast suffered! In dark Gethsemane; Thy bloody sweat has healed me, Thy pangs have set me free.

O Christ, how Thou hast suffered!
In Pilate's judgment hall,
To bear my sins and sickness,
To set me free from all.

O Jesus, Thou hast suffered, My stripes were laid on Thee; Thy thorny crown and scourging From sickness made me free.

# Valedictory Service in Clapham

VERY solemn and impressive service took place in the Clapham Tabernacle on the occasion of Mrs. Taylor's farewell service prior to her return to the Belgian Congo. It was one of the most touching meetings of its kind we have ever witnessed. One could not help but admire our sister's brave spirit.

It seemed most fitting that Miss Henderson should conduct this service. Twelve years previously she had first met Mrs. Taylor in the Belgian Congo, where she herself was labouring at the time. Mrs. Salter from the same field was on the platform, Mrs. Taylor's mother and her aunt, Mrs. Saxon Walshaw, were also present. Miss Henderson gave a very strong appeal urging the Lord's people to hold on in prayer for Mrs. Taylor, reminding them of the sudden Home-call of Pastor Cyril Taylor some months previously, and that Mrs. Taylor was returning under the shadow of this great sorrow, leaving four children in the homeland and taking the two youngest back with her to the field. Miss Henderson's earnest pleading on Mrs. Taylor's behalf was most touching. Her love for missionaries and their work out on the distant fields is well-known to many Elim people.

Mrs. Taylor, before speaking, rendered a lovely solo entitled: "Make me a captive, Lord." She sang with such feeling that all present were deeply moved. Then came her message—"Ezekiel's vision,"—water to the ankles, knees, loins, and waters to swim in. Step by step she gave her experience, telling how the call to the mission field came to her at the age of seventeen when she was working in her father's business. The Lord gave her a vision and confirmed it afterward by His Word. She pointed out how necessary it was to get the Word of God to back home any vision we may have, and begged people never to go out to the mission field on a vision alone. The talk was a very practical and heart-searching one. Mrs. Taylor has a

remarkable sense of humour, which, she says, is necessary for every missionary to possess. She told a most thrilling, but sad story of how two women who had lost their reason were delivered and saved by the

ministry of a young native Christian boy of seventeen. Never have we heard such a stirring account of how the Devil can torture lives. These two lives were completely under the enemy's power, yet God in His loving kindness and mercy sent His servant (young though he was) with words of life and healing. Truly their joy knew no bounds, and the Lord was glorified through their complete deliverance. The news spread from village to village and caused people to marvel and wonder at the power of the gospel and the grace of a loving God.

Our sister concluded her soul-stirring message by saying that at one time she was not willing to part with one of her children, but now by the grace of God she was parting from four. She knew that the Lord had promised to be a husband to the widow and had experienced His wonderful grace and power in her life spiritually and physically in a marvellous way since her loved one was taken. Now she was going forth in His strength alone. Truly Mrs. Taylor's brave example has been an inspiration to many. She is able to endure because she is strongly conscious of a power beyond her own.

Our prayers will certainly follow this faithful servant of the Lord on her outward journey. Throughout the days to come we will be thinking of her and picturing her as we pray for her, among the women and girls of dark, sad, Congoland, who are so much laid upon her heart and amongst whom specially she is going to labour with all the zeal of her practical and loving heart.



# From Here, There, and Everywhere

### THE PRIVILEGE OF WOMEN

Judge Dodson, in sentencing a woman, said: "It is the privilege of your sex to bring to man not only comfort but inspiration to do noble things and it is obvious that you have done exactly the opposite."

### MISSIONARY PATIENCE

There has just arrived in London a Moravian missionary named the Rev. Walter Asboe. His station is Kylang, Tibet, 10,500 feet high. The Press report is as follows:

"The only communication with the rest of the world is by a pass 13,500 feet high, which is snowed under for five months in the year. I saw Mr. Asboe in a bare upper room at the Moravian headquarters. It was like meeting a man from a different planet. There is a Franciscan simplicity in his expression.

"I asked him about converts. They have made only 146 in eighty years. He himself has made only two in fourteen years. 'It is painfully slow work,' he said, 'but in the eighty years the Moravians have been in Tibet social conditions have enormously improved.'

"Mr. Asboe's parish is the size of Wales. He tours 500 miles on foot each season, his wife looking after the station while he is gone.

#### CARRYING THE BIBLE

Canadian officials apparently carry Bibles in their knapsacks—a practice which explains a unique distinction held by the Hon. Vincent Massey, the Dominion's new High Commissioner in London.

When Mr. and Mrs. Massey were travelling on the official Government train to meet Lord Tweedsmuir, it was recollected that before leaving Canada Mr. Massey must be sworn in as High Commissioner.

Mr. Mackenzie King suggested the swearing-in should be done on the spot.

A Bible was called for. No fewer than four were instantly forthcoming. The Prime Minister produced one, so did Mr. Massey, and Mrs. Massey brought hers, and the Clerk to the Privy Council produced his. The oath was taken on Mrs. Massey's Bible.

Mr. Massey took the oath of office on his wife's Bible on a moving train.

#### **NEVER HEARD OF GOD**

It seems impossible that the following could happen in our land, but, sad to say, it is true:

An eighteen-year-old youth was not allowed to give evidence at Ipswich County Court yesterday because he had never heard of God.

When he was unable to pronounce the words of the oath, Judge Hildesley asked him: "Have you ever heard of Almighty God?"

The youth replied, "No."

His Honour: " Have you been to school?"

- " Yes."
- "Who taught you about religion?"
- " A bloke."
- "Didn't he teach you who God was?"
- " No."

Judge Hildesley said that he was not sure that he

could allow the witness to be sworn, as he did not seem to have any knowledge of God.

"A person of eighteen comes into the witness-box and is supposed to have been to school and cannot take the oath because he cannot pronounce the name of Almighty God and cannot tell me who Almighty God is," the Judge exclaimed.

The youth then stepped down.

### SAD CONTRASTS

In a striking editorial a sad fact is vividly pointed out:

"Thus, Mr. Speaker, at 11 o'clock this morning came to an end the cruellest and most terrible war that ever scourged mankind. I hope we may say that thus, this fateful morning, came to an end all wars."

These were the words with which, on November 11th, 1918, Mr. Lloyd George informed the House of Commons of the conclusion of the Armistice.

To-day it is announced that in order to defend the civil population from gas attacks, over 30,000,000 masks for adults are to be manufactured and about 3,000,000 anti-gas containers for small children and babies. Experiments are also being conducted with gasproof tents over perambulators. They are thought to be efficient, but the experimenters are not sure. The babies may be poisoned after all."

### LIFE IN THE BIBLE

An illustration from the American Sunday School Times is worth broadcasting:

"An old professor of biology used to hold a little brown seed in his hand. 'I know just exactly the composition of this seed. It has in it nitrogen, hydrogen, and carbon. I know the exact proportions. I can make a seed that will look exactly like it. But if I plant my seed it will come to naught; its elements will simply be absorbed in the soil. If I plant the seed God made, it will become a plant, because it contains the mysterious principle which we call the life principle." This Bible looks like other books. We cannot understand altogether its marvellous power. Planted in good ground, it shows that it has the life principle in itself; it brings forth spiritual life; it bears fruitage."

## EGYPTIAN SIGNIFICANCE

It is significant that Egypt is pressing for independence. She wishes to be free from British control so completely that she can herself join the League of Nations in her own right. Daniel xi. 43 shows that Egypt will either through force or willingness be at the command of Antichrist. The trend of events is moving toward such a result.

## GIPSY SMITH AND SANKEY

Preachers, here is a delightful story for you:

Gipsy Smith recently related his earliest recollection of Mr. Sankey, the famous singer. When Mr. Moody and Mr. Sankey were conducting their first great meetings in London at Burdett Hall, Bow (he said), a Mr. Goodman took Mr. Sankey out on the Saturday

for a drive into the forest. "This gentleman knew of my father and his two brothers, the three converted gipsies, and brought him to the gipsy camp. I did not know very much about these things. I was only a little wild boy in the woods. I did not know anything about Mr. Sankey, but when he drove up in the little pony-trap he looked a big beaming sort of man; so I got round as a child would, and climbed up

on the hub of the wheel. Mr. Sankey put his hand on my head and said, ' The Lord bless this boy and make him a preacher.' I was not converted then, but I never forgot it. When I first visited America, I found out Mr. Sankey and asked him if he remembered the incident. He said he did. 'What became of the boy?' 'Well,' I said, 'he is here!'"

# THE REVIVAL TEAM AT BATH

A NCIENT Bath is linked with Rome. To the Christian ancient Rome is linked with Christ, and thank God for the closest of all links that exists between the Christ and many of the citizens of twentieth century Bath.

Seven years ago the Principal and his indefatigable co-workers pioneered the Foursquare Gospel message here and left behind them an assembly, men and women whose lives had been changed and blessed by the God-honoured ministry of His servants. The critics were busy, "I'll give them six months to finish up," said one, and many similar expressions were heard. Well, well, come with me, the Principal is paying us his first return visit and is coming back to the Assembly Rooms where his campaign was held in 1928. It is Saturday afternoon and 2.30. We look in to see that all is in readiness, for the meeting starts at 3 o'clock, and we notice that the hall is at least half-filled. Yes, as the report in the Bath Chronicle and Herald puts it: "There were hundreds of people waiting to welcome him back." We remember Gamaliel's words concerning the apostles, " If this work be of God ye cannot overthrow it."

As the meeting progressed it was evident that the Principal had not changed—the same message, the same assurance, the same power and with what rejoicing we write, the same results. There were only four meetings and Sunday evening soon came, the last meeting. The hall was crowded with eager listeners and an adjoining hall was opened to accommodate the people. Fifteen decisions had been recorded in the afternoon meeting. With eager anticipation we settled down to hear the message. The hush of God's presence was felt as the message went forth upon "The Church," and during the appeal nineteen more were added to that Church.

# **REVIVALIST'S RETURN VISIT**Stirring Scenes at Bath Assembly Rooms

Seven years ago Principal George Jeffreys, Founder and Leader of the Elim Foursquare Gospel Alliance, conducted a revival and healing campaign at Bath. On Saturday, writes a representative of this paper, when the first of four meetings was held, I saw hundreds of people at the Assembly Rooms waiting to welcome him back, a striking testimony not only to the solidarity of the church which is now continuing its activities in the old Post Office, but also to the large place that Principal Jeffreys has filled in the hearts of the people.

During the past year Principal Jeffreys has held, in addition to campaigns in this country, meetings in Palestine, France and Switzerland, where remarkable scenes of revival were witnessed. In the Holy Land, where revival meetings were attended by people of all faiths, including Church of England ministers and the Bishop of Palestine, scenes such as those recorded in the Acts of the Apostles were re-enacted, sick folk stood in doorways, sat on the wayside, or outside

In Switzerland t. largest halls, theatres and exhibition buildings wer booked, but even tr proved too small to commodate the grerowds which sought mission. Twelve thouse converts, it is claimen,

have been recorded in a tour of less than five weeks. State churches threw open their doors to Principal Jeffreys, and State church ministers joined in the wave of revival that swept the country.

### FOUNDED WORLD CRUSADE

During the past twenty years Principal Jeffreys has pioneered the combined message of the New Birth, Bodily Healing, Baptism of the Holy Spirit and the Second Advent of Jesus Christ, in the largest halls obtainable in the British Isles.

Multitudes of lives and homes claim to have been transformed under his ministry, and in addition they claim that real miracles of bodily healing have been witnessed by wondering crowds at his meetings.

In order to meet the ever-increasing demands from the homeland and all parts of the world for fellowship, Principal Jeffreys has founded the World Revival Crusade, which is a fellowship of people of all denominations who are banding themselves together in prayer for Revival. A church known as the Church of the Great Physician, Kensington Temple, London, has been set aside as a prayer centre for those who are sick, a prayer-meeting being held every day between 11 and 12 when requests from all parts of the world are dealt with.

Principal Jeffreys and his party have just concluded a campaign in Bristol and are now embarking on a short church tour.

## **HEALING SERVICE**

One minister who attended Saturday night's meeting in the Assembly Rooms was heard to remark, "Whitfield is dead, yet this is the same voice speaking."

The ballroom was filled at all the services, and on Sunday night extra seating accommodation had to be provided. Pastor Darragh led the congregation in the singing of old and new choruses before the meetings commenced, and Pastor Newsham delighted with his solos. Both on Saturday and Sunday afternoons Divine Healing services were held, those seeking healing being anointed with oil by the Principal.

On Saturday evening Principal Jeffreys delivered a stirring address on Miracles. He has a very logical and forceful



"I was crushed . . . so much so that I despaired of life, but that was to make me rely not on myself, but on the God who raises the dead."—2 Cor. i. 8 (Mossatt).

"Crushed!" Ah, yes, but only that the life of Jesus May flow more freely through this broken, emptied life; A thousand things may fling their overwhelming challenge And yet the heart unmoved remains amid the strife.

something of being ground in the mills of affliction and adversity; the pressure of things that were against him was so great that it appeared he must be utterly overwhelmed. But God revealed the purpose of this harassing humiliation. It was to teach him the lesson of entire trust in the God who quickens the dead.

How many things there are that combine to crush the sensitive heart and reduce it to despair. Circumstances develop that press the soul to breaking point, driving it to its face before God. And yet the soul thus beset often makes some new and glorious discovery of spiritual wealth; flung back upon the Lord it strikes a vein of gold. Crushed with a sense of disappointment and failure.

"Crushed!" Like his Master, Paul was treading the pathway of crucifixion; he had entered the same school as His Lord, and was graduating amid the buffetings and blows of unfriendly circumstances. We are not surprised to find his ministry yielding such rich and fragrant results. The blows which fell upon him only released these inner fountains of spiritual energy.

And dost thou think it strange, my soul,
These crushing blows that fall?
They are but instruments of God
Which have obey'd His call.
A little while and thou shalt see
The purpose of this pain,
Thy heart shall then rejoice to know
That loss is turned to gain.

O Thou who didst tread the Via Dolorosa of reproach and rejection, and reached the throne of Thy kingdom through the bitterness of Golgotha, I also would fain learn the secret of that life which comes to triumphant perfection by drinking deeply of the cup of humiliation and crucifixion. Show me, blessed Lord, that it is the emptied life which is truly energised; that it is the life which is ready for the stripping that comes to real spiritual sovereignty; that it is the broken heart that sheds a benediction on its path; that out of the mortification of self manhood comes to true maturity; that life becomes most dynamic when it is most dependent.

I thank Thee, O Lord, that Thou hast not spared me the crucible and the cross—that Thou hast not appointed me to some pleasant and sheltered bower of ease, but in Thy wisdom Thou hast called me to drive the plough of service through the hard and stubborn furrows of difficulty. I bless Thee that Thou hast in Thy mercy taken from me all other confidence that I may anchor alone in Thee.

# Extracts from a Sermon preached by Pastor LESLIE H. NEWSHAM

'N these days we hear much about worship, and yet I feel it is one of those words that by constant repetition has lost its true meaning.

It would be well for us if we first remind ourselves of the true meaning of this word.

1. What does the word "worship" mean?


The dictionary definition of this word is:-"To honour with extravagant love as a lover."

The last definition in the

explains what we mean by worship.

2. Worship implies sacrifice (Gen. xxii. 1-19).

The very first time we find the word "worship" used in the Scriptures, it is connected with sacrifice.





You will recall the record. Abraham was called to make the greatest sacrifice of his life. Although presented by God with a son after many long years of waiting, he is called to offer that very son as a sacrifice on the altar; he might have rebelled against such a test, he might have lowered the standard of faithfulness and said "this is too much"; but no; I think I can hear him joining with the Psalmist singing, "I delight to do Thy will, O my God "; he knew that his God was the God of life and of death, or as the Apostle Paul writing to the Heb-

rews says: "Accounting that God was able to raise him up, even from the dead" (xi. 19). He turned sacrifice into worship. "I and the lad will go yonder and worship." There is not the slightest intimation in those words that he was about to face the greatest test of his life, simply a glorious abandonment to the will of God.

I want you to notice that in verse 5 we are told that Abraham said "I and the lad . . . will worship." Surely this is the most perfect act of worship on record. Both Abraham and Isaac in perfect accord, the giver and the sacrifice, not a struggle as the ropes bind the sacrifice to the altar, not a single murmur or hint of rebellion against such testing. Hallelujah! Alas, how often we rebel when God calls on us to suffer hardship, to sacrifice a little comfort for His sake, how we worry and fret. May God teach us such confidence in Himself that we may be able to say "I delight to do Thy will " even when His will does not coincide with our desire: only then shall we know true worship.

Abraham's worship consisted in offering his most treasured possession. Isaac's worship lay in offering his life as a sacrifice upon the altar.

God does not call us all to worship in the same way, but let us always remember that there is no

worship in thoughtless or careless giving to God, whether it be my service as a Pastor, your praise on a Sunday morning, the careless giving of an odd halfpenny or even a pound note.

When our Lord stood in the Temple and watched the people giving, His eye beheld the heart, not the gift; He places at the head of the subscription list, not the name of a wealthy patron, but that of a poor widow who gave two mites. He knew what those two mites represented to that widow-" all the living that she had." He also knew what the pretentious gifts of the scribes represented—but a very small percentage of their wealth. Where there is true worship, there is sacrifice of some sort as a mark of sincerity. Sacrifice is the keynote of worship.

3. Worship implies love.

Worship is not a mere form of speech or service in which the lips are engaged in uttering words, however beautiful. Worship is not a mere repetition of phrases; however beautiful they may sound to the ear of the artist they have no value except they be a true and sincere expression of the heart. Worship is not mere phraseology. How easy it is for us to slip into insincerity! How easy to let our lips utter words that of which our hearts know not the meaning. How easy to beguile ourselves into thinking that can we but please the ear of the pastor and our brethren we have pleased God. Oh that we may learn the true meaning of that blessed word. Worship is the outflowing of a heart saturated with love to the Redeemer, the lips speaking under the impulse of a heart throbbing with thankfulness to God, not the carefully thought out words of the theologian, but the spontaneous expression of a heart in love with the Creator. Miracle of miracles that such a thing is possible! The sinful rebellious human race to be loved and to love the Creator.

I recall a journalist's report of a visit to one of our London churches in which, if I remember aright, he stated that the one thing that he noticed in the morning service was that each one that prayed spoke to Christ as one whom they really were in love with. That was a testimony worth having.

Let us refer to that beautiful scene in the house of Simon the leper. The Lord was taking supper, and whilst He was eating, John tells us that it was Mary who anointed the head of Jesus with oil of spikenard. The oil was probably worth £10 or £12 and the practical mind called this act "waste," but Mary was worshipping in the language of a love that was far too wonderful for the carnally-minded to understand; they said, "Why not have sold the oil and given the money to the poor?" but Jesus said "She hath wrought a good work on Me."

Without love our worship becomes cold and formal and calculating, the life of holiness and separation a (continued on page 32).

What blessing as the congregation listened to the Principal expound the mission of the Lord as outlined in the passage in Isaiah which He read on that sabbath day in the synagogue at Nazareth at the beginning of His public ministry. The Christ who preached good tidings to the poor, who healed the broken in heart, who delivered the captives of Satan and who would one day usher in the reign of peace and joy was presented so clearly and beautifully that five hands were raised to signify that this Christ was henceforth to be their Lord.

Then with increased joy, before this day of blessing closed we sang, "By and by we'll see the King," and the Principal's closing prayer was the voice of nearly every heart, "Lord Jesus, come quickly."

# Visit of Principal George Jeffreys and Revival Party to Salisbury.

Report by Pastor F. J. Slemming.

Thomas Carlyle in his *Miscellanies* asks the question, "How did Christianity arise and spread abroad among men?" He then goes on to answer his own question. "It arose in the mystic deeps of man's soul, and it spread abroad by the 'preaching of the Word,'... then it flew like hallowed fire from heart to heart, till all whom it touched were purified and illuminated by its power."

These words give the reason for the success of the early Church. They hold the key to the secret of the success and progress of the Church in this present age. The ministry of Principal Jeffreys and the Revival Party provides an eloquent demonstration of Carlyle's contention.

The Salisbury saints have just had a brief visit from the Party and in response to the preaching of the Word God's people have been stirred, hearts have been touched, bodies have been healed and at least twenty-eight souls entered into the Kingdom.

For a long time this Church has prayed for a visit from Principal George Jeffreys and it was with joy and great expectancy that at last the tidings came—the Party would be making their first visit to Salisbusy—for three meetings. The Church prayed, believed, and laboured for the success of these special services. Did God answer prayer? Yes, abundantly! The time for the first meeting found the ground floor of

the church thronged and the crowds filling up the gallery. Immediately the meeting commenced we seemed to enter into the spirit of revival. The singing went with a swing. The Principal ministered the Word of life with great power and unction, and six souls were saved. The sick were prayed for, and at this time the presence of God was overwhelming.

On the Wednesday afternoon, well before time to commence, we were gladdened to see a congregation gathered as large as the previous evening. Again God's blessings fell in showers and another twelve souls were won for Christ. Then all too soon came the closing meeting. The Church was packed with a fine audience—God's mighty power again worked through His servant, and yet another ten souls were brought from darkness to light.

I have since the close of these meetings listened to scores of testimonies. One old man, over forty years a local preacher, says, "I have not had such an uplift for forty years." A sister testifies, "God blessed me spiritually and bodily." Another, "It all seemed too good to be true." Another says, "I was greatly impressed by the services. Your leader, like all great men, deals with principles." And yet another says, "We've been needing a spiritual uplift, that word of encouragement and exhortation, for years. It has been a blessing to me."

And so the testimonies came in. To God be the

Salisbury Church must register its thanks to God for the visit of Principal Jeffreys and the Revival Party, and now continue in prayer that God might bring them back for a real revival campaign in this needy city.

# SPIRITUAL HEALING Principal George Jeffreys in Salisbury Scenes of Religious Fervour

Principal George Jeffreys, founder and leader of the Elim Foursquare Gospel Alliance, whose evangelistic zeal has made him as prominent as D. L. Moody in the middle 'seventies, and Dr. R. A. Torrey in the early years of the present century, was in Salisbury this week. He addressed meetings at the Elim Tabernacle in Scotts Lane on Tuesday evening and Wednesday afternoon and evening, and hundreds of people gathered to hear him. There were scenes of religious fervour when he called for witnesses for Christ, and again when he laid hands on those who sought divine healing. On Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons the hall was comfortably filled, but on Wednesday evening queues formed long before the doors were open, and the hall was packed.

The Principal is undertaking a tour of the Foursquare Gospel Alliance Churches in England, accompanied by Pastors R. E. Darragh, A. Edsor and L. H. Newsham.

Pastor Darragh, who conducts the singing in the Albert Hall at the vast gatherings of the Alliance at Easter each year, acted in this capacity on Tuesday evening. To begin he chose the chorus, "Isn't it grand to be a Christian, isn't it grand?" and the audience sang it with heartiness. Pastor Slemming, who has charge of the work of the Alliance in Salisbury, led in prayer.

## THE PRINCIPAL COMES!

And then Principal Jeffreys came to the rostrum. He chose the hymn, "Hark! my soul, it is the Lord," and conducting it with slow, rhythmic gesture, gave it a dignity which was in marked contrast to the breathless haste of the choruses.

He explained that the Foursquare Gospel Alliance stood for the foursquare message of the gospel—Jesus the Saviour, the Healer, the Baptiser, the coming King. "The word was not coined by anyone in this world," he said, "It is God-breathed. The altars of Old Testament days were built foursquare. All who have proved Christ to be the real Saviour say 'Alleluia.'" In swift response came the chorus he sought. "There are many here to-night," he went on, "who are glad that the Foursquare Gospel Alliance came to this city." And there were fervent "Amens."

The Principal turned to the subject of Divine Healing. "It is attracting the attention of the whole of Christendom to-day," he said. "Tens of thousands claim to have been healed in answer to prayer. Miracles as marvellous as those recorded in the Acts of the Apostles have taken place amid wondering crowds. Blind eyes have been opened under the power of God, tumours and cancers have shrivelled and disappeared, the lame and the halt and the paralysed have found new vigour and new life return to them. There is a vast difference between what is known as faith healing and divine healing. You can have some kind of healing by faith without being a Christian. You can believe in the power of mind over matter, or healing along psychological lines, without being a Christian. Cults and creeds that are not orthodox at all can stand for some kinds of faith healing, and it is not necessary to accept the Bible to believe in faith healing. You may turn aside the Scriptures and yet take a stand for healing by faith."

## "WE BELIEVE THIS"

"But that is not the stand we take as the Foursquare Gospel Movement. We believe in something more than faith healing.

We believe in divine healing—healing through the Christ of the Scriptures.

"We believe we are old-fashioned enough," the speaker went on, "to believe that Christ is still living, and that He is working for His people to-day in very much the same way that He worked for them when He was on earth. God has, in a marvellous way, divided healing into two realms—the natural attentive to heal itself, and in all my twenty years of spiritual healing I have thanked God for doctors and nurses. I have never yet come across a single doctor who claimed the power to heal; all he can do is to help Nature to heal itself. But only people who are bordering on fanaticism, and who are always ready to accept extreme views, would say anything against doctors and nurses.

"The higher realm is the realm of the spiritual, and if cases are turned aside as incurable in the natural realm they can be healed in the higher realm. I maintain that every minister of the gospel operates in that realm. Christianity is essentially a religion of the supernatural. If you deny the supernatural and the miraculous, you deny Christianity."

#### THE LAYING ON OF HANDS

He spoke for nearly an hour. Then he had heads bowed while he called for hands to be raised for Christ.

In due course he called those who sought healing, and a score or so left their seats and knelt before the rostrum. Mr. Jeffreys moved swiftly, laying his hands on each, while the congregation softly sang a chorus. They eventually made their way back to their seats. Further prayers, another chorus, and the service was over.

burden, and sacrifice for God an imposition.

Love is the dynamic of worship, the working power, whether it be the worship of the lips or the life; without love we cannot worship. Oh for the love of God to be shed abroad in our hearts, then there would be no lack of worshippers, no lack of funds, no lack of willing workers, we should find ourselves prompted spontaneously to make not only our lips but our lives join in one great pæan of praise and thanksgiving. "Unto Him who hath loved us and washed us from our sins; unto Him be the glory for ever, Amen."

How different this is to much that is termed worship to-day. I am reminded of an occasion when the Lord in rebuking the scribes and Pharisees winged an arrow of truth home to their hearts that upset their complacency. "Ye hypocrites! well did Isaiah prophesy of you saying, This people honoureth Me with their lips, but their heart is far from Me, but in vain do they worship Me." Vain worship, empty words that meant nothing. God save us from such insincerity, and teach us to worship Thee in Spirit and in truth.

# THE QUESTION OF THE DAY

66 TALK of questions of the day! There is only one question, and that is the Gospel."

So wrote W. E. Gladstone, and the statement

So wrote W. E. Gladstone, and the statement is a remarkable one to come from the pen of one who was so thoroughly acquainted with all the "questions" of his day.

But is it true? Ask yonder man, from whose bedside the doctor has just turned away with a grave face. He has but a few days to live. What question commands his interest to the exclusion of every other? If he is wise, he will reply, "The Gospel." No question of business, wealth, prospects, friends, amusements can vie in his estimation with that of the Gospel.

But you, my reader, are a dying creature, as well as he. Can you deny it? Do you know of any power on earth that can keep your door bolted when death knocks? Hear what one of the leading infidel writers of the day has to say upon the subject: "Of our loving and our studying, of our fortunes and our fame, what comes but vexation and disenchantment and a narrow bed, with a pillow of gravel and a counterpane of moss?" So said Robert Blatchford, and his words are true. Would that it could be said that to him also the question of questions was the Gospel!

What is the "Gospel," this question that eclipses every other? It is the good news, glad tidings. The very word "Gospel" means that. But the Gospel, or the Glad Tidings is the message that has come into the world from God Himself, addressed to all mankind. It speaks of a Saviour from sin, from the power of Satan, from the fear of death, from the judgment of God.

Do you realise that the pursuer, death, is already upon your track? Have you discovered that your sins have exposed you to God's righteous wrath? Then, surely, to you there can be no question of such interest as this: How may I be saved? For an answer, we point you to Jesus. Though the eternal Son of God, He became Man, and sits as such upon the throne. In Him alone salvation is to be found. Long years ago He came into the

world, declaring God's love for man. But His words were refused and Himself crucified. His death, however, was no mere martyr's death. He suffered and died to make atonement for our sins. In virtue of the work which He thus accomplished the sinner who believes in Him is saved.

No work, no prayers, no promises, no strivings are necessary to complete the sacrifice. The work is "finished." And the Gospel which is preached to you is the glad tidings of present forgiveness and salvation. On that account "Whosoever believeth in Him shall receive remission of sins." "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved "(Acts x. 43; xvi. 31).

The great question, then, for you is: How do you treat the Gospel? You may treat it in one of three ways. You may either (1) reject it; (2) neglect it; or (3) accept it.

To reject the message of salvation is like a sick man refusing to take the only remedy that will cure him. Men are not so foolish as to do this when it is a question of the body. Why, then, act in such a way when the question at issue is far more serious—the welfare of the soul for ever?

To neglect the Gospel, to spend one's life without giving heed to its call, is equally foolish. A sick man who neglects to take his medicine gets no more benefit from it than the one who deliberately rejects it.

The wise course is to accept the Gospel as God's gracious message to you. Flee to the Saviour of whom it speaks, and, assuredly, the forgiveness which it proclaims shall be yours, even at this very moment.

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth on Him should not perish, but have everlasting life. For God sent not His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through Him might be saved. He that believeth on Him is not condemned" (John iii. 16-18).

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
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
