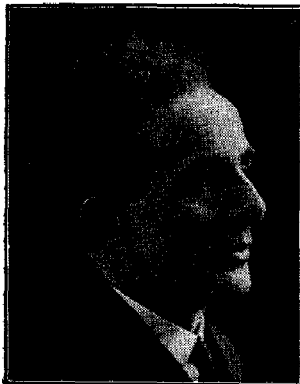
"The Lord is Not Unmindful"

THESE are challenging words—which should stir the heart of every Crusader—uttered by that grand old warrior, Paul. As his days of warfare for his Master are drawing to a close he calls on his young son in the faith, Timothy, to cultivate those virtues which should characterise a good soldier of the Cross.

When studying this text I asked a distinguished soldier what were the three most necessary qualities in a good soldier. His answer was, "Courage, loyalty, and discipline."

As those who desire to earn the title of a good soldier of Jesus Christ we will study these three points in the order in which they were given.

Courage.

"Be strong and of good courage" (Joshua x. 25).

There are few qualities in a man which are more admired than courage. We have all been thrilled by the records of great deeds of bravery. So deeply is this regard for courage engrained in our minds that cowardice is regarded as the most shameful of failings.

There is, however, another sort of courage which, although it does not earn headlines in the papers or thrill the world, is just as worthy of the name. I refer to the courage of our convictions, which means standing true to Jesus in a world whose standards are so contrary to His. Again, the courage that keeps our hearts undaunted when faced by sorrow, pain and disaster. This is the courage to endure hardness that is born of faith in the great Captain of our salvation.

And again, the courage that plods on behind the scenes, doing the ordinary duties of life faithfully, unseen and unapplauded, without waiting for any special vision or inspiration. It has been well said, "It takes almighty grace to take the next step when there is no vision and no spectator—the next step in devotion, the next step in your study, in your reading, in your kitchen; the next step in your duty, when there is no vision from God, no enthusiasm and no spectator. It takes far more of the grace of God, far more conscious drawing upon God to take that step than it does to preach the gospel.

Every Christian has to partake of what was the essence of the Incarnation, viz.: to bring the thing down into flesh and blood actualities and work it out through the finger tips. We flag when there is no vision, no uplift, but just the common round, the trivial task. The thing that tells in the long run for God and for men is the steady persevering work in the unseen, and the only way to keep the life uncrushed is by looking to God. Ask God to keep the eyes of your spirit open to the risen Christ, and it will be impossible for drudgery to damp you. Continually get away from pettiness of mind and thought out into the thirteenth chapter of John's Gospel."

A Good Soldier of JESUS CHRIST

Loyalty.

"Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life" (Rev. ii. 10).

There is embodied in this word one of the loveliest and best of all the virtues, and alas, one of the rarest. How seldom do we find a friend whose loyalty is unquestionable, and when found what a comfort and strength such a friend is. The following words were uttered by the famous Italian patriot, Garibaldi: "I am going out from Rome. I offer neither pay, nor quarters, nor provisions. I offer hunger, thirst, forced marches, battles, death. Let him who loves his country with his heart, and not with his lips only, follow me." In response thousands responded, willing to lay down their lives. Shall we give a lesser loyalty to the King of kings, than a soldier gives to his earthly king?

There are more ways than one of playing Judas, and we shall not maintain our loyalty to our Saviour and Captain unless we have a vital living relationship with Him, through His Word, and prayer, by which is meant a real, constant heart communion with God.

When there is real loyalty to Jesus—in thought and word and deed—then there will be absolute loyalty to others, for the life that is lived in communion with Jesus cannot stoop to those meannesses and disloyalties which are so utterly foreign to His Spirit.

Discipline, or Obedience.

"He openeth also their ear to discipline" (Job xxxvi. 10).

What a hard, uncomfortable word this is, but there can be no lasting success either in the world or in the kingdom of God for the undisciplined character. A soldier is a man under authority, and even the Son of God "learned obedience by the things which He suffered," and it has been said by a great servant of God that "The resentment of discipline of any kind will warp the whole life away from God's purpose."

The principle of obedience runs through the Scriptures from beginning to end and there is no substitute for it. It is impossible to over-estimate its value and importance, nor is it speaking too strongly to say that it is more important than anything else in our relationship to God—for if we are obedient to the Word of God, and to His voice in our own hearts all will be well, and we shall bring joy to the heart of God, and live lives that will bring honour to His name.

Great are the rewards of obedience and tragic the consequences of disobedience. The results of one act of disobedience may mean a lifetime of sorrow and regret.

Discipline is a hard word, but it is an encouraging thought that the words "discipline" and "disciple" are derived from the same root, which assures us that if we will submit to the discipline that God puts us through we shall be made into disciples, and who could ask anything more of life than to be a disciple of the Lord Jesus Christ?

THY KINGDOM COME

DISCERNING THE ESSENTIAL

A young woman whose life was full of lofty ambitions, found herself occupied day after day with disagreeable household tasks. As the future seemed to shut down hopelessly around these homely duties, the girl grew complaining and bitter.

One day her father, who was the village doctor, said to her: "Do you see those vials? They are cheap, worthless things in themselves, but in one I put a deadly poison, in another a sweet perfume, in another a healing medicine. Nobody cares for the vials themselves, but what they carry."

So with our duties, insignificant and worthless in themselves; but the patience, or anger, or high thinking, or bitterness which we put into them is the important thing, the immortal thing.—The Silver Cross.

"CONFINED TO THE BIBLE"

A young minister, not so long out of an up-to-date school of the prophets, was asked why he did not preach from the Word of God rather than from modern

fiction. His reply was, "Must a man be confined to the Bible?"

"Confined! Do you mean to say you are pinched when you seek in the Bible for sermon material? That is like a soft-shell crab saying, 'Must I be confined to the Atlantic Ocean?'" — Pentecostal Evangel.

MAN PLUS GOD

There is no limit to what God can do with us and through us if we are willing. Our resources are limited, His are not. Alone, Dwight L. Moody is a shoe clerk, struggling to make a bare living for himself. With God, Dwight L. Moody touches millions of lives and changes the spiritual atmosphere of two continents. Alone, one is insignificant and all but useless in the world. With God, one's life becomes a power for good, how great only eternity can reveal. "Wait for the promise of the Father," said Jesus to the disciples, "and ye shall receive power." Let us wait upon God and He will show how great things He can accomplish through us.—"Christian Observer."

"IN CHRIST JESUS"

A phrase that is characteristic of the apostle Paul is, "in Christ Jesus." Dr. Erdman says that in his epistles Paul uses the words, "in Christ," thirty-seven times; "in Christ Jesus," forty-one times; and "in the Lord," forty-three times.

Herein lies the explanation of the complete consecration of the great apostle. Because he himself knew from experience what it means to become "a new creature in Christ Jesus," he was convinced that nothing else that he could do for men could ever be quite so important as to bring them to a knowledge of his Lord.

It is possible for all Christians to attain to the same high plane of service if we are willing to follow the same high way of consecration. "For the true Christian," continues Dr. Erdman, "all plans and purposes, all activities, all hopes, are in Christ."—"Christian Observer."

THE Fountain of Eternal Youth—Ponce de Leon thought he would discover these magical waters gushing skyward in crystal streams of health. But, though he found the gay, flower-clad shores of Florida, he returned to his native land without learning the whereabouts of the fabled fountain. It evaded his search, and Ponce de Leon died an old man believing the fountain to be mere fiction.

This instinct for self-preservation, for immortality, for a life that never ends, is innate in the human heart.

We would fain retain the dew of youth, and forgo the experience of decay and death.

However, men still die.

Since Elijah, none has been known to escape.

Neither Pasteur, nor Burbank, nor Edison, nor Lodge, has found the secret of victory over the encroachment of age.

2,700 years ago Isaiah wrote, "We all do fade as a leaf" (Isaiah lxiv. 6).

This dictum still holds good. Like a leaf, human life has its season of beauty, vigour and usefulness. The blistering winds of summer, followed by the biting winds of autumn and winter cause the leaf to wither and die. And so do we humans wither and die.

Fading beauty, wrinkled brows, greying hair, failing strength, weakening mentality—all testify that Isaiah was right: "We all do fade as a leaf."

Autumn time is here once more, reminding of this doleful reality.

Autumn with her facile brush is painting all the landscape with vari-hued colours—flaming orange,

gorgeous reds, pools of yellow, paling greens, subdued browns—and setting every bush aflame with God.

Autumn is once again loosening the leaves from the trees, and gently blanketing the earth with patches of colour very much like grandmother's old patchwork quilt.

And falling leaves speak to us of fading life.

The boast of heraldry, the pomp of power,
And all that beauty, all that wealth e'er gave,
Await alike the inevitable hour;

Yes, Gray was right, too.

That is so far as imperishable human life is concerned.

And, bless God, in that day, we, too, shall be youthful, for we shall be like Him—young, possessing deathless life—and happy!

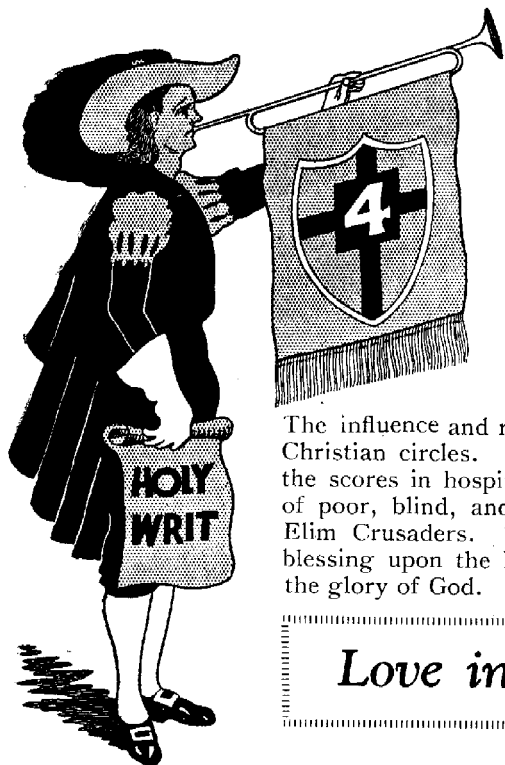
So, after all, the falling leaves just tell us that the winter of life is a bit nearer, and if winter comes can spring be far behind?

The Scripture Union Daily Portions: Meditations by Pastor E. C. W. BOULTON

Sunday, Oct. 11th. I. Tim. vi. 1-10.

“The love of money is the root of all evil” (verse 10).

At first the mind is inclined to challenge such a sweeping statement, but on deeper insight we see how profoundly true is the inspired conclusion of the Apostle. If we could trace the stream of evil to its source we should in most cases find that an inordinate lust for wealth, and the power which it often brings, has led men forth upon the path of unrighteousness. Money may be an excellent servant but a bad master. It has played no small part in the extension of God’s Kingdom, enabling the servants of the Lord to spread the glorious tidings of the Gospel to lands afar. And yet money has been indirectly responsible for the downfall of many a Christian worker, yielding to its power they have developed into time-servers rather than God-pleasers. Blessed Master do Thou keep me in right relationship to that which would seek to make me its prisoner!

PRAYER TOPIC:

For widespread revival as a result of the Principal’s campaigns in Switzerland.

Monday, Oct. 12th. I. Tim. vi. 11-21.

“Keep that which is committed to thy trust” (verse 20).

There are certain things for which God holds us responsible, and for which we shall one day be called to account to Him. Things which we are to guard against the attacks of the enemy. To His people God has given His own precious and priceless Word; we are to preserve it from a merciless criticism, defending its truths, embodying its virtue, practising its precepts, and claiming its promises. Our influence is another valuable power which we must take care to guard lest it lose its savour, and become of none effect in the service of God. We may trifle with that which is of infinite value and thus sacrifice our greatest opportunity for real spiritual achievement. Grant unto Thy servant, O Lord, wisdom and grace to be found faithful in that day of reckoning, that I may prove true to my trust.

PRAYER TOPIC:

That the many souls led to Christ during the recent Crusader week, may, in the hour of temptation, prove the keeping power of Christ.

Tuesday, Oct. 13th. II. Tim. i. 1-18.

“Being mindful of thy tears” (verse 4).

Here was a ministry that knew something of the travail of tears. To the aged Apostle those tears were significant of deep heart fellowship with himself in his sufferings for the sake of Christ. God

had bound these two hearts together in fellowship with Himself and His redemptive purpose. They were tears of tender solicitude for the one who was so soon to accomplish his work and be baptised into death with his Lord. Beloved disciple of Jesus, perhaps thou, too, art treading the pathway of tears; tears shed o’er the tragic folly of some loved one, or the base betrayal of some sacred friendship. Draw comfort from the thought that thy Lord Himself is “mindful of thy tears”; He knows the path that you take at this time. Thy tears are precious to Him inasmuch as they are the fruit of faithfulness to Him.

PRAYER TOPIC:

That God’s protecting hand may rest upon His faithful ones in Spain during the terrible times through which they are passing.

Wednesday, Oct. 14th. II. Tim. ii. 1-13.

“He abideth faithful” (verse 13).

Amid the crumbling things of earth, and the perishing and fleeting joys of this world, there is One who stands un-failing and unchanging, “the same yesterday, to-day, and forever.” Hallelujah! O my soul, thou mayest at all times drink of this deep, sweet wellspring of pleasure. When thou art bereft of that which was once the solace of thy heart and the joy of thine eyes, thou canst turn to this blessed fountain of unmixed gladness, and drink thereof until the temple of thy being is filled with the joy that is imperishable. “No change Jehovah knows!” Thou shalt find Him always equal to thy need, always responsive to thy call, ever at hand to help and heal.

PRAYER TOPIC:

That the power and blessing of God may rest in a special way upon the ministry of the London Crusader Choir in their visits to H.M. Prisons.

Thursday, Oct. 15th. II. Tim. ii. 14-26.

“Strive not about words to no profit” (verse 14).

How much valuable time and energy is wasted in the Church of God in profitless word battles. In this respect it is so easy to “strain at a gnat, and swallow a camel.” We may insist upon our doctrinal definitions in a spirit that is sadly foreign to that of Christ. Words are poor substitutes for Christlike living. We may be meticulously-careful in the choice of our words, and exceedingly skilful in their use, but should the language of our lives contradict the utterance of our lips then we are betrayed into a false position which can only issue in dishonour to the Name that we bear. Save me, O Lord, from a spirit of unhealthy dissension. Let me not catch the contagion of con-

tention. Grant unto Thy child humbleness of heart—gentleness of spirit, so that when called to defend Thy truth I may do so graciously.

PRAYER TOPIC:

Praise for God’s blessing upon recent campaigns, and earnest prayer that those who conduct the campaigns may be kept under the anointing of the Holy Ghost.

Friday, Oct. 16th. II. Tim. iii. 1-17.

“Continue” (verse 14).

“Continue!” Blessed are the feet that have learnt to tread the path of continuance. Many who have never known the thrill of ecstatic experience, never seen the vivid vision, have faithfully and unfaintingly pursued the path of continuance in well doing. Day after day, year after year, they have pressed on, often in the face of formidable odds. Few if any miracles have marked their course, no outstanding answers to prayer have cheered their hearts, but they have never taken their hand from the plough of devoted service. The greatest thing that could be said of them is that “they continued.” They refused to succumb to discouragement or yield to disappointment; they lived for the goal to which at the beginning of their Christian pilgrimage they had pledged themselves. Blessed Master, let me too join the ranks of those who continue “to the end.”

Devotion to Christ

FROM the ranks of those who served under the late Lord Allenby during the World War campaign in Palestine comes an account of Christian devotion on the part of the British general which can be recorded in connection with few, if any, other military leaders of history.

The eye-witness was Thomas Murgeditchian, an Armenian known to many people as Thomas Effendi. The story of the British general who prayed for nearly a week to stave off the necessity of bombarding the sacred shrines of the Holy City, is passed on by a Detroit relief administrator who employed Effendi for several years.

Allenby's army was encamped on the outskirts of Jerusalem when the British war office cabled instructions that the city should be taken without delay. Allenby sent a return message, begging to be allowed to use his own discretion in deciding upon the date of occupancy, and suggesting one week's delay.

He then sent planes over Jerusalem and dropped messages in Arabic, Hebrew, Syrian and English, warning the inhabitants that his guns were trained on the city; that he could blow it to pieces; but that he was reluctant to destroy the sacred shrines of Christendom. He gave them six days to surrender peaceably. A special threat was directed against the Mohammedan Mosque of Omar.

For six days, morning and evening, Allenby's entire staff met with him to pray for the surrender of Jerusalem. After spending almost the entire sixth day on his knees, Lord Allenby was informed that a delegation was approaching under a flag of truce. Before seeing the group, among whom were the mayor of the city and the heads of the Mohammedans, the Jews and the Syrians, Allenby offered up a prayer of thanks to God.

He was given the key to David's Gate, which had not been entered since Christ's time except by conquering heroes. A triumphal march was arranged for the general, and the streets were lined with people waiting to greet him. As Allenby approached the gate on a white charger, he dismounted, to the surprise of those who waited to greet him.

"The gate through which my Lord and Saviour walked so often, I cannot ride through," he said, and he entered Jerusalem on foot.

IN the hills of Galilee overlooking the lake one pleasant Sunday afternoon, we tried to recapture some of the New Testament scenes with the desire uppermost of seeing "no man save Jesus only." The result was disappointing in the sense that the local scene failed—He belonged to all time and every place. Paul's words rebuked me—"though we have known Christ after the flesh, yet know we Him so no more," so I gave myself up to a rambling meditation on the Man of men.

"Very God and very man" is the Westminster catechism's definition of the Man Christ Jesus. In him humanity and divinity were the complement of each other. His humanity enhances our conception of God. Jesus used, and inspired the world with the things that other teachers considered a hindrance. With Him the human body and the common duties and relationships of life became as sacramental as any form of worship. He gave life a new meaning not divorced from its stern realities nor detached from ordinary experience. That is why *the Man* is such a perfect Saviour of men. That is why He has captured the imagination of the world and led captive at His will millions of peoples of all nations for sixty generations. When the Emperor Napoleon became philosopher in exile he acknowledged Jesus to be the Man of men. "Jesus Christ was more than man," he said one day to an officer, "Alexander, Cæsar, Charlemagne and myself founded great empires upon force. Jesus alone founded His Empire upon love, and to this very day millions would die for Him. Think of it—this Nazarene stretches His dead hand down the centuries and controls the destinies of men."

Here among the hills where He lived most of His divinely human life as a working man, and by the Lake of Galilee where He taught the greatest truths in the simplest language, we try to see and hear Him in the setting of the gospel story.

We appreciate what other travellers say about a sense of His presence remaining in the Holy Land, but confess that we found it very elusive. The grandeur of His character was difficult to fit into the mundane work-a-day life. Yet that was the miracle of the Incarnation as Tennyson saw it:—

And so the Word had breath, and wrought
With human hands the creed of creeds,
In loveliness of perfect deeds,
More strong than all poetic thought.

That is the fascination that the Life of Lives has for those who contemplate the blending of its human and divine natures. The mystery and majesty of His

greatness became overpowering betimes as we meditated on the consequences of one short life lived on gospel principles. The disconsolate sense of futility that crushed the spirit in failing to harmonise the triumphant Jesus of history with the person of the lowly Jesus of

Nazareth was overcome by a thought that came as forcefully as though an audible voice had spoken it—the success of His life is not the result of man's recognition, but the reward of God's acceptance of it.

We recalled that it was not far from where we were sitting that Jesus was baptised, and how that the Father had spoken His approval of Jesus' obscure life—"This is My beloved Son in whom I am well pleased." We reflected on this as we had often done before, but now it seemed like a new revelation. Of His life as an ordinary working man God said He was well pleased—that was not all. With the same consciousness of a communication, the thought continued that we too, in every walk of life may live as Jesus did, for the glory of the Father, and look forward to one day hearing Him say—"Well done, thou good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy

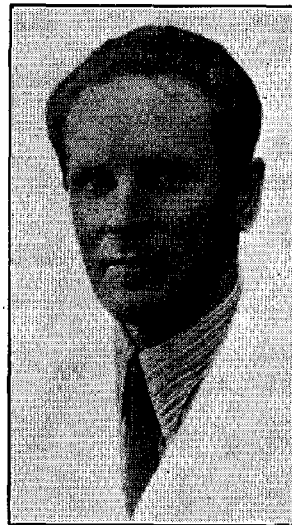
Lord." It was encouraging to think that though our lives were as limited as the life of Jesus was at Nazareth, and our environment as drab as the bleak hills of Gadara across the lake—and as lonely too—the Father only requires us to be faithful. We might do that as acceptably as the first fisherman who followed Jesus from the lakeside yonder, by being loyal to His teaching and following Him with all our heart, sharing the joint-fellowship of that early discipleship.

The inspiration of these moments in the silence of the lonely hills was more real than can ever be expressed in words.

I heard Him call,
"Come follow,"
That was all,
The world grew dim,
My soul went after Him,
Who would not follow if they heard Him call?

We felt the spell of His personality in such a way that life can never be quite the same again.

Dr. Edersheim's description of Matthew, the tax

collector's call which we had heard read that day, expressed my feeling of gratefulness. "Long before that eventful day that for ever decided his life, Matthew had, in heart, become a disciple of Jesus. Only he dared not, could not, have hoped for personal recognition—far less for call to discipleship. Yet, when it came and Jesus fixed on him that look of love which searched the inmost deep of the soul and made Him the true Fisher of men, it needed not a moment's thought or consideration. When He spake it—'Follow Me'—the past seemed all swallowed up in the present heaven of bliss. Matthew said not a word, for his soul was in the speechless surprise of unexpected love and grace; but he rose up, left the custom-house and followed Him."

In the East we met those in whose minds Jesus had never been associated with the Jews, and who were indignant at the suggestion. Multitudes of Moslems and Christians had never thought of Jesus as a Jew, neither was He; that is to say, He was never *Jewish* in the popular meaning of the word. The Judaism that Jesus represented had little in common with the Talmudic variety of His day. Like so many Evangelicals of our own time the Pharisees flattered themselves that they were contending for the entire Word of God, but they were unwittingly the blind victims of doctrines and traditions of men that brought them into constant conflict with Jesus' interpretation of the Scriptures. In defence of their little prejudices, their opposition of Jesus grew to hate. They found fault with everything He did, and when all their low-down tricks to undermine His influence failed, they resorted to the foul means that ended with His crucifixion.

When a national repentance overtakes the Jews, and a change in their religious character comes through a changed attitude to Christ, then they will revert to their former status as children of Judah—Israel. Until that day dawns Paul's ban will remain upon them: "The Jews, who both killed the Lord Jesus and their own prophets, and have persecuted us; and they please not God and are contrary to all men, forbidding

us to speak to the Gentiles that they might be saved, to fill up their sins alway: for the wrath is come upon them to the uttermost" (I. Thess. ii. 14-16).

With the revival of Jewish Nationalism a right perspective of Jesus' relation to the Jews is of vital importance. It constitutes a new factor in evangelism, especially among the unchristian peoples of the Near East. In a heart-to-heart conversation about Christ with an educated Moslem in Transjordan we discovered that one of his difficulties about accepting Jesus as his Saviour was the association of Christ with modern Jewry in Palestine.

In trying to associate Jesus with His Galilean ministry we were compelled to abandon that region of imagination and find Him in the realm of reality where claims and counter-claims about Him harassed the minds of men to-day.

The Saviour of the world cannot be localised nor nationalised. He is every-man's Man. The force of this fact had never been so impressive as when conversing with men of the various religions of the East. With them all, Jesus takes precedence over every prophet that has ever lived. The Mahommedans venerate Christ as they do Mahomet and they accept the sinlessness of Jesus but have never made that claim for their own Prophet.

General Gordon, the great Christian soldier whom Gladstone called "A hero of heroes," discovered this, and also that many missionaries were not aware of it. In his diary he wrote, "I am sure that it is unknown to the generality of our missionaries in Moslem countries that in the Koran no imputation of sin

is made on our Lord, neither is it hinted that He had need of pardon. . . . The Moslems do not say Mahomet was without sin, and the Koran often acknowledges that he erred, but no Muslim will say 'Jesus sinned.' "

Visiting one of the beautiful State Churches in Athens we had a serious chat about Christ with a cultured gentleman who was a member of the Church. Among many revealing statements about religion in Greece, he said—"It seems to me that we have got away from the foundations of the Christian faith and the Christ of the New Testament." There is this dissatisfaction to be found everywhere with religion, but Jesus remains supreme.

In Palestine there is a disturbing influence about Jesus among the Jews; one cried, "Oh, that we could only know of a truth who this Jesus is, and what is His true relation to us wanderers!"

In Him humanity and divinity were the complement of each other.

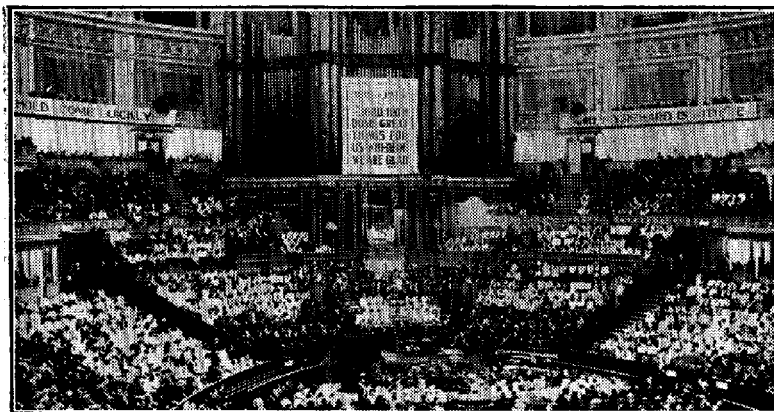

 Right from the cross unto his goal, His God.*

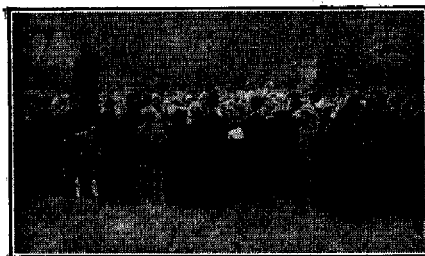

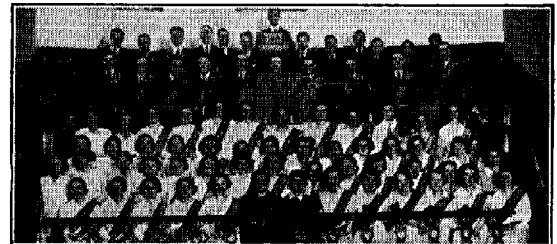

Pathfinders

"Scott appealed for four men for his perilous Arctic expedition. The response came in thousands. Men pressed for a place without conditions and without reservations. Nay, some offered to pay their own expenses, no matter how menial the task."—Pathfinders pledged to the death.

LISTEN to the words of Jesus in the dark, electric hours of his tempestuous earthly journey to the Cross, standing with calm, poised dignity in the presence of His disciples—"If any man will come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow Me." Prince of sufferers, the Great Lonely Greatness of the world was laying down an eternal condition for service. The kingdom He was establishing was not an earthly kingdom. The personalities of that kingdom as warriors on the great battle-field of life were not to use earthly ammunition or carnal weapons but spiritual power and Christ-like grace. As Christians we have no rights, self-justification often provokes to further feud. The grace of silence carries with it a soothing dignity that prevails more than argument. We are living our lives in the light of eternity, and in that eternity we who suffer with Him here will reign with Him there. Out of the tangled puzzle of untoward circumstances He can bring us forth more than conquerors every time.

But the Cross must be the attraction and the pivotal point around which we labour drawing others to rest under its shadow. There can be no slack, selfish lukewarmness, but single-hearted desire for the triumph of His Cross in our own lives and then in the lives of others. The symbol of our fellowship is not a burning bush, nor a dove of peace, nor a halo round a saintly head, but a cross. The One to whom we owe everything suffered and died on Calvary. His love must be our constraining force, His keeping power our confidence, His will our greatest joy. Personal, passionate devotion to Jesus must be the ground of our consecration. Not the needs of the heathen, not the needs of men, but whole-hearted, absolute love to Himself. Steal away to Gethsemane at the still midnight hour. In the pale, passionless moonlight under the olive trees, see His princely form there prostrate on the ground; our kingly Redeemer, our God, whose bloody sweat like heavy dew stains the sod; and then let your heart be pierced and stricken as you grasp what keenness of anguish and suffering He endured in His intercession for the sin-blighted sons of men. To become pathfinders down here leading others to share in the glories of His kingdom by and by we have to behold the "face marred more than any man's." We must catch the passion of Calvary love that led Him to the Cross until that same passion creates in us such compassion that we ache and bleed and plead in prevailing

prayer for the sin-stained, starved, broken-hearted wanderers of earth.

A pathfinder's business is to make a way for others to find the Lord of glory. Loyal pathfinders will practise consistently and continuously self-obliviation, and will be jealous that nothing in disposition or in temperament will sully His name or make a barrier in approach to Him. There can be that humble courtesy to Jesus by delicate, definite self-effacement, that those we are wooing will not be attracted to us, but will see Him, the chiefest of ten thousand and the altogether lovely One. John desired the Bridegroom to be admired, His voice to be heard. The friend of the Bridegroom must decrease that his Lord may increase. If we attract to ourselves we become a necessity to those we help. This cripples growth, and begets human imitators void of passion and desire. When God gets hold of the depths in us we are truly jealous not to be connected with any help or blessing we impart. The power of the Holy Ghost possessing the deep places in our lives will appeal to depth in those who listen, so that the face of the human becomes dimmed and obliterated by reason of the glory of the Lord. "This, my joy therefore, is fulfilled," said John, and so should it be with us. Pathfinders, yes. "Ready to give our all and not to count the cost of giving, to fight and not to mind the wounds, to toil and not to seek for rest, to be a strong hand in the dark to another in time of need."

But all through life I see a Cross,
Where souls of men yield up their breath;
There is no life except by death.
There is no vision but by faith,
Nor justice but by taking blame,
Nor glory, but by learning shame.

LIBERATED !

Since we are risen with Christ we are not in our sins. In His renewal from the dead we are lifted for ever from their dark unfolding condemnation. They lose sight of self in their prayer life and look not upon the difficulties and hindrances; they look unto Jesus and He carries them through. Thank God you have many mighty weapons which are strong and powerful, even to the bringing down of the strongholds of Satan—the precious blood of Jesus ("They overcame him by the blood of the Lamb," Rev. xii. 11), the high praises of God in your mouth (singing your way through), the two-edged sword in your hand (Psalm cxlix. 6), and the love of God which has been shed abroad in your hearts by the Holy Ghost to meet the hate which is still levelled against the Christ, His work and His children.

How wonderful it is to be in the service of the King. We all admire people who do things, no matter what their line is. We like to see people succeed in the work of their choice. We are always deeply interested in people who work. Thank God, our Crusaders are

workers. They have had the vision of the fields already white unto harvest; they can see the golden grain waving in the breeze of Holy Ghost wind, ripening under the rays that come from the Sun of Righteousness, and so they stream into the harvest field all eager to save the harvest for the great Husbandman—their Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. They know that the time is short, that there is no time to lose, that the coming of their Master draweth nigh, that if they are to gather all in and save the harvest they must hurry, and so their work is full. They must visit that sick home or rush off to that hospital; they joyfully take their stand, winter and summer, at the street corner declaring the "good news"; they take the light of the gospel of Jesus Christ into the prisons; they sow and reap in the lodging houses. Every opportunity is grasped of loving service. I have often been asked by men of the world: "What is this thing that makes the youth of your movement lay down the promise of earthly riches, deny themselves of the natural desires and ambitions of youth, and yet seem so happy?" I have answered every time, "There is pleasure in His service more than all." It is the joy of their lives to serve others, to feel and know that somebody needs them, and to know that in the onward march of life they leave behind in their trail those who are better because they have passed that way.

And so our Crusaders march on singing, "We'll work till Jesus comes, then we'll be gathered home." What a day that will be when they shall hear that word fall from His loving lips, "Blessed are ye, I was an hungered and ye gave Me meat, I was thirsty and ye gave Me drink, I was a stranger and ye took Me in, naked and ye clothed Me, I was sick and ye visited Me, I was in prison and ye came unto Me." They will realise then that whatsoever they did in loving service for the needy they did it as unto the Lord.

The honours of Thy name.

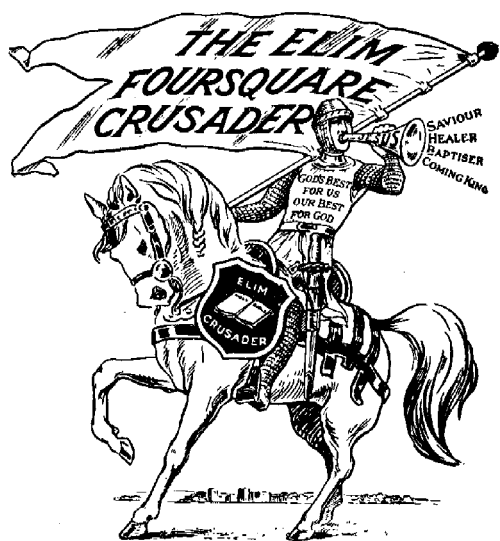
TRACT DISTRIBUTION AT DUNFERMLINE

AT a business men's noonday prayer meeting an aged missionary related some of the incidents connected with his life work in Africa. The missionary would have read on and on, but the darky just could not restrain himself, he roared with delight and he cried, "Good! Good!" and away he ran. A moment later he administered a resounding whack on the bare back of a friend, a worker in the field, and prancing about him, conveyed the joyful tidings, that, "an angel is going to chain that wicked monster, the devil. Ha! Ha!" And without waiting for an answer, he ran hither and thither and with a broad grin on his swarthy face and a twinkle in his eyes, he imparted his startling information to all the villagers. Finally, he supplemented his information, by shouting as loudly as he could, "The devil is going to be bound a thousand years."

Judging by the acclaim and expressive gestures, it could readily be seen, that, what they had heard was regarded as important, interesting and welcome news. Superstition, spiritism, and devilry had swayed their minds and lives so tenaciously, that the banishment of the prince of wickedness, darkness and despair, strongly appealed to them.

The punishment of Satan is in reality only a minor affair. By far the most important, all-surpassing event

in human history occurred more than nineteen hundred years ago, when the eternally existing I AM, the Prince of Glory, permitted cruel men to punish Him and to lead Him, as a sheep to the slaughter. 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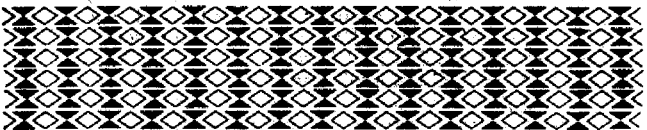
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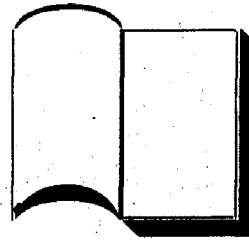
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
