Life a Trust

HEN one sees the carelessness of the many one wonders if thoughtful consideration of the value of the life has been given. Yet how valuable and vital life is. "For none of us liveth to himself, and no man dieth to himself." What changes take place as soon as a child is born. Husband and wife become parents, their parents become grandparents; there springs up a number of cousins, uncles, and aunts. Results of a child being born reach further still until there is a receding ripple from its existence that reaches out, it may be to the utmost shores of time and space. The scope of relationship, indeed, does not stop with earthly and present relationships, but reaches into the unseen and the eternal, for within that child is a living soul and before it lies eternity. "For whether we live unto the Lord; and whether we die, we die unto the Lord."

One might say concerning one's life, "It is my own, I can do with it as I please, and what difference does that make to anyone else?" How narrow is such a view and how untrue. Not long ago a man received world-wide notoriety, the law having convicted him of a crime. He paid the penalty with his life. But was that all? His wife was left with a broken heart, his child to

through life, his mother was crushed; and, were we to carry the matter further, how many there were who suffered, some of them as intensely as he. For suffering cannot be reckoned according to physical pains, but must be reckoned according to mental anguish and heart pangs.

A young man was arrested for being drunk and, upon regaining his intelligence after his debauchery, he begged that he might be permitted his release as, he said, were his mother to know of his plight it would kill her. Who in that case would be the greater sufferer? No doubt the mother, innocent of any crime or wrong herself, yet suffering with his suffering and disgrace. The world is filled with woe because of sins, disappointments, and sorrows caused by others. May we take heed to our ways that our existence may be

made a blessing rather than a curse, a benediction instead of an execration.

What has been entrusted to us in life? We may mention a few of the many things. To begin with we have been blessed with life itself. The infant becomes a child, the child a youth, the youth a man, the man an old man, leaving the footprints of his life behind him while he becomes an inhabiter of eternity in either

But life alone is not all that has been entrusted to us. There are the capabilities of being which may be used for either good or evil, although we trust that in our case they may be used for good only. Some are endowed with natural talents. They readily become efficient in music, art, or language. Some are capable in business. There seems no end to the possibilities attainable through natural talents.

Then there are the attainments made possible through association. Many more than usually prominent men in the business or professional world credit their success not so much to their ability as to their opportunities. Mr. Carnegie was employed in the office of a dispatcher for the Pennsylvania Railroad when one day trains were approaching each other from different directions. He knew a wreck was inevitable unless warning could be given. It was not within his province to give the alarm, but the proper person not being present, he took it upon himself to send the warning. The result was that the disaster was avoided and he was brought before the eyes of those higher than he with consequent promotion. While working there he learned about steel and the possibilities in that industry, and finally became

of his day. What might this Scottish lad have been had not circumstances favoured him? Our natural abilities ought to be developed to their full so far as we are able, and we ought to seek associations that will benefit our progress in accomplishment and normal attainment. A man in the East said that he made it his practice to try to associate with persons more intelligent or better than he, for by so doing he was ever

absorbing to himself their knowledge, and the better

qualities which they possessed.

There are natural developments that are possible for all of us, but think of the spiritual favours and attainments which may be ours. Those talents which we have by nature may be given to God or to the adversary. How much it is to be regretted when young men or women give their strength, beauty, ability, and often their souls, to the Devil, when these could all be used to the glory of God. Two sons may come from the same home. One becomes an upright, respected Christian man; the other becomes an immoral sot. What a contrast! One daughter gives her life and service to God and receives a host of upright and honourable friends. Another chooses the downward way, gives her life to debauchery and evil and becomes surrounded with the lewd and vile whose friendships prove untrue and treacherous. These thoughts bring

THE BURNING QUESTION,

what are we doing with our lives? Are we an asset or a liability, a moral uplift or a reproach?

With life comes responsibility. We have responsibility to our household, to our fellowmen, and to God. "No man liveth to himself." If we degrade ourselves we degrade our family; if we abuse our citizenship, our community and nation suffer. If we reproach God and reject His gospel, He will deal with us in judgment. We may here in a measure escape the just rewards of our lives, but we cannot avoid meeting the stern realities of human responsibility when we stand before the Great White Throne. If life has been given to sin, "be sure your sin will find you out." We hear much about our Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour. Do you not know that He is equally our judge? "For

we must all appear before the Judgment Seat of Christ." "Because He hath appointed a day in the which He will judge the world in righteousness, by that man whom He hath ordained; whereof He hath given assurance unto all men, in that He hath raised Him from the dead." Our lives will be tested by His searching eye, and we shall be rewarded every one according as his work shall be. For those who have served God and their fellowmen aright, there is prepared

"Enter thou into the joy of thy Lord." For those who have done wickedly "there remaineth a certain fearful looking for of judgment and fiery indignation which shall devour the adversaries."

Should we speak to any who have started down the way of destruction, we offer a star of brightness in the world's darkness. There is One who can change our course, starting us on a different path, a new path, the way that leads to heaven's glory. Listen to the promise, "Though your sins be as scarlet they shall be as white as snow: though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool." How can these things be? Because God has provided a ransom. "For unto us a Child is born, unto us a Son is given: and the government shall be upon His shoulder." "Thou shalt call His name Jesus, for He shall save His people from their sins." Knowing the condition into which man has fallen, God has given our Lord Jesus as a sacrifice for our sins, and if we will believe in Him, asking for grace to blot out the past, and power to strengthen against evil, He will in no wise cast us out. Let all of us aspire to that which is best. Let none of us turn from our Saviour and Lord. Let him who feels his need give his heart to God, for, "Behold, now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation."

NTIL Mr. Hsieh was thirty years of age he was without God and without hope. To him life had always been a serious matter, but somehow without goal or meaning. There seemed to be a lack, and although he sought for something beyond his knowledge he seemed to get nowhere.

Mr. Hsieh lived in the small island town, Ho-Yueh-Chow, situated on the banks of the Yangtse River, China. One day he heard of a strange religion which the foreigners had brought to his native land. But those who were propagating this new religion came to Ho-Yueh-Chow, rented a house, and preached every day to large crowds. What did it all mean?

One day a man asked Mr. Hsieh to go with him to the Gospel Hall, but his invitation was refused. However, when he learned that no foreigner would be preaching, but only one of his own people, he agreed to go. The text of the Chinese evangelist, who spoke to the people that day, was, "God is love." It was such a new idea to Mr. Hsieh. Could it really be possible that God loved human beings? In the writings of the sages he had read of a Supreme Being, but they did not know much about Him—and never had He been represented as a God of love.

Mr. Hsieh was attracted by this new light—here was something to give new meaning to life!

He was held by this truth as he had never been in all his life. During the following days he had many talks with the mission people. Many were the questions he asked, but one seemed preeminent. He could find no answer. Why was it necessary for God to send His only Son to die such a cruel death on the Cross? The Chinese evangelist told him it was but the demonstration of the love of God for mankind, but Mr. Hsieh could not fathom such love. For a whole year he thought about the Cross but seemed to get nowhere.

But one evening God revealed the Lord Jesus to Him. It was twilight. He was sitting in his room when suddenly the whole room was flooded with light. Before him a cross was upraised, and upon that cross was the Son of God. With eyes filled with love He looked at Mr. Hsieh saying, "I suffered this for you!" Hsieh found his face was wet with tears, and never from that hour did he doubt the necessity of the atoning death of the Son of God for sinful man. He surrendered his entire being to the Lord Jesus Christ, received the forgiveness of his sins, and became a witness for the Saviour.

Is life without meaning to you? It will remain so until you let the Lord Jesus take control. He stands at your heart's door just now saying, "I suffered this for you!" And will you just now open that door, bid Him enter, and make Him supreme in your life? If you will there will be life indeed! "He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life: and he that believeth not the Son of God shall not see life; but the wrath of God abideth on him."

Possessing the Land

Thou art old and stricken in years and there remaineth yet very much land to be possessed.—Joshua xiii. 1.

E wonder what the thoughts of Joshua were at this time. Full of courage and zeal he had gone over Jordan to possess the land. Much had been gained, they were enjoying the fruits of the country and all the enemies were subdued. Then there appears to have been a settling down.

Why this rebuke from the Lord? Because He would have no settling down, no giving up, no saying that enough has been done, no spirit of false contentment. This has been a fault of Christendom all through the years, content with small things instead of going out for the highest and the utmost.

Just before our Lord's ascension He gave the command to His disciples, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." How faithfully those early Christians attempted to carry out their Lord's command, yet to-day we find there are many heathen who have never heard the gospel, and some are hearing now for the first time.

Joshua might have said, "It is not my fault, Lord. I was willing to go in and possess the land, but the people were not with me. As for me, I will serve the Lord, but I cannot get the people to follow."

This has been the cry of many a dear servant of God, of many a minister who has laboured to stir up revival in the hearts of His people. It has been noticed in Church history how God has taken a single individual to accomplish that which the whole Church should have done. Many a time He has lifted a "nobody" and used that one to stay the rising tide of spiritual death. Turning back the powers of darkness such souls have lifted the people on to a higher spiritual plane and have gone forth proclaiming the fact that, "there is still much land to be possessed." They have proclaimed a salvation to the uttermost.

All through the ages we find a reluctance, a hesitancy on the part of God's people to possess their spiritual heritage. The promises of God are as real and true as ever. This glorious gospel is still the power of God unto salvation. He is to-day, Jehovah Ropheca, the Healer of His people.

How slow Israel was to go and possess. God had given them a wonderful promise. "Every place that the sole of your foot shall tread upon, that have I given unto you." In the face of that promise we might want to blame God's ancient people for not obeying, but what about the glorious promises He has given to us? Are we not slow to go and possess the land?

The weakness of the Church in this day is due to the fact that many have not received the Holy Ghost, or we may have received the Holy Ghost yet have ignored His Gifts and graces. We do not recognise Him as Captain of the Lord's host, we have failed to keep Him to the front. We have often gone to Him last when we should have done that first. He has been in the hinder part of the ship when He should have been at the helm. Many have failed to keep step with God, and because of this have failed to possess the land also.

Isaiah tells us that God looked and saw there was no man, and wondered that there was no intercessor. Intercession is a piece of ground that many fail to possess. The prayer life is shallow and in consequence service is weak.

Ezekiel shows how God sought for a man to make up the hedge and stand in the gap before Him that He should not destroy it, but He found none. Have we found a gap that we can fill. If not let us see to it at once and go up and possess the land.

In every age those who do great things for the extension of God's Kingdom have had to go on alone. Abraham took this step. He went forth not knowing whither he went, and God led him over to the land of promise. Some have left the beaten track of worldly religion, have broken free from the ruts and stepped out alone with God. These are the men and women who have possessed the land. Because they have not attempted to make the gospel of Christ harmonise with modern theories, men have regarded them as extravagant and unreasonable. Fox, Wesley and General Booth were all misunderstood. What they did and taught seemed to some so far in advance of what the people knew. They were cutting new channels, going on to possess the land.

Many thought they taught a new doctrine, but it was just another piece of land. The Foursquare Gospel may seem to some a new thing, but in reality we are just going higher up the mountain.

Go up and possess the land! First you must be in it. You must cross over Jordan, dying to self and sin, that the life of Him who takes us onward may be made manifest. Remember that the enemy will contest every inch of the way, but we know he is an usurper.

Every piece that the sole of your foot shall tread upon has been given you by God. All the promises of God in Him are yea and amen unto the glory of God. Remember the Captain of our salvation is with us. "Lo I am with you always, even unto the end of the age."

Sunday, February 27th. Matt. ix. 35-38 and x. 1-15.

" His harvest" (verse 38).

" His harvest!" Alas, too often we come to regard the harvest as ours rather than His. Ours are the souls that are won, and ours too the credit for winning them. We are insistent on the recognition of our success. Because they came to Christ through our ministry must they needs bear the stamp of our personality? Do we want to perpetuate the fact that we led them to the Cross? Oh, to realise that the harvest is His, and that the glory is His. True He has called us into partnership with Himself-made us co-workers with Him in this great and glorious adventure. Yet because of this we must not assume too much. The thought that it is indeed His harvest should make us all the more careful and prayerful in the way in which we perform our God-appointed task. PRAYER TOPIC:

Monday, February 28th. Matthew x. 16-33.

" Take no thought " (verse 19).

What a strange command. Surely in the circumstances visualised in the text there would be the greatest need for most careful thought. How often it is thus. The wise and the prudent of this world stumble at the revelation of divine truths, and the simple and humble enter into possession and enjoyment of these very things. It is to the open heart that God comes and unfolds the secrets and mysteries of the Kingdom. So o'ten it is human wisdom that prevents the mind from receiving the vision from above. Men cling to their own ideas and fail to grasp the message of the Lord. The Jews with all their religious training missed the meaning of the gospel of life which Jesus brought. The door into the Kingdom was opened wide but they failed to go in thereat. They received Him not because their minds were blinded by their own foolish pride and self-will. They lived in a realm that made them inaccessible to light and truth.

PRAYER TOPIC:

For blessing to attend the reading of these daily meditations.

Friday, March 4th. Matthew xii. 1-21. "How they might destroy Him" (verse 14).

Thus the miracle which Christ had wrought produced nothing but murderous intent in the hearts of these leaders of religious thought. Instead of provoking them to wonder and worship it strengthened their desire to slay the Christ. Right through the ages this has been repeated in the history of the Christian Church. The manifestation of divine power has aroused the bitter opposition of those who refused to admit the claims of Christ to sovereignty. How vain are all such attempts to extinguish the fire which God lights. It burns on with increasing power over men's hearts and consciences. The gates of hell cannot prevail against the Son of God. All satanic plans to destroy the ever-living One have been foiled. Like the waves of the sea are broken on the rock-bound coast so the fury of man spends itself in vain against the impregnable rock of truth.

PRAYER TOPIC:

For God's suffering saints in Spain and China, that they may be upheld at this time.

Saturday, March 5th. Matthew xii. 22-37.

"Every idle word" (verse 36).

What a power for good or ill the tongue may possess! The influence of a word is incalculable-it may affect eternal issues. Therefore what a need that this member of the body should be governed by the Spirit of Christ, so that our lips may show forth His praise. With the tongue we may minister life or death, darkness or light, joy or sorrow. It is a most solemn thought that God will hold us to account for the use to which we have put our lips. It is when our lips are "kept for the Master's use" that they bring forth the fruit of righteousness. Blessed Lord, take these lips of mine and guard the springs of thought that I may magnify. Thee by every word that I speak. Let me not lend my lips to unworthy things. Grant unto Thy child the wisdom to speak under the urge of Thy Holy Spirit.

Faith looks at the promises instead of staggering in weakness before the apparent impossibility. Thas become more and more evident that we need again and again to reiterate the Pentecostal truths for which we stand. A Pentecostal body stripped of these supernatural gifts of the Spirit is little different to any other evangelical movement. It was only because God poured out these miraculous gifts and because they were rejected by the Christians of other denominations that the necessity arose for another movement untrammelled by the chains of unbelief or the grave-clothes of a dead formalism.

If we are to lose the supernatural manifestations of the Holy Ghost let us return to the bosom of professing Christendom. It is unnecessary to bear the stigma of being "peculiar" when our only "peculiarity" is that we are not "peculiar" enough!

Is it not spiritual treason for a man to enter a Pentecostal ministry, or to join a Pentecostal Church, and then to turn round and deny the supernatural gifts of the Spirit? While it is true that we do not want wild-fire let us beware lest in attempting to put out the wild-fire we stamp out the fire of the Holy Ghost. Orderliness in our worship we should have since "God is not the author of confusion" (I. Cor. xiv. 33), but may God deliver us from the order of the graveyard!

Some time ago I was preaching in a certain Church and arranged a series of

WAITING MEETINGS

at which a number received the Baptism in the Holy Ghost. It was reported that there had not been a single waiting meeting in that Church for seven years! Things ought not so to be! We believe in the Holy Ghost—let us then have times of waiting upon God for the incoming of His power and blessing, for "they that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength" (Isaiah xl. 31).

The inspired apostle commences his great chapter on these supernatural gifts of the Holy Spirit with these words, "Now concerning spiritual gifts, brethren, I would not have you ignorant" (I. Cor. xii. 1).

Nothing is so blinding as ignorance, for ignorance keeps one in darkness of mind. It is reported that in the Scottish banks alone there is a sum of over £40,000,000 in unclaimed deposits. This could only be so because many who have a right to some of this money are ignorant of the fact. How many Christians are ignorant of these spiritual deposits which God has placed in heaven's bank and so make no claim to them.

Prejudice keeps many a Christian from applying to God for these gifts of the Spirit. Bunyan in his *Holy War* places Mr. Prejudice and sixty deaf men under him in charge of the Eargate of the City of Mansoul. How could any message from Emmanuel get past such a guard as that?

THESE GREAT TRUTHS.

The divine purpose in the bestowal of these spiritual gifts is that they may provide the basis for Christian ministry. This is evident from a number of passages in Scripture. In I. Corinthians xii. 7 the manifestation of the Spirit is said to be given to every man "to profit withal." Therefore to use these gifts out of divine order or for self-exaltation is contrary to the divine plan. They are for the edification, or the building up, of the Church. Wherefore Peter writes in his epistle (I. Peter iv. 10, 11), "As every man hath received the gift, even so minister the same one to another, as good stewards of the manifold grace of God . . ."

Natural ability may fill the Church's empty pews and may glorify the preacher, but ministry without the fulness of the Spirit can never turn the hearts of men to God. Years ago F. B. Meyer was speaking at a Northfield Convention and in the course of his sermon he said, "So many young men are having a hard time working for God, instead of yielding themselves to God, that He may do His own work through them." At that time Dr. Chapman, the evangelist, was so discouraged that he had written out his resignation intending to return to secular employment. He saw a report of this sermon in the Tribune, and tearing up his resignation, he went to his room and on his knees yielded himself utterly to God for Him to do His own work through him. After that God led him out into his great revival work. Since God has called all truly converted into the

MINISTRY OF RECONCILIATION,

for all saints are in the spiritual priesthood (I. Peter ii. 9), there is a great need of these supernatural gifts to-day.

Some expositors would persuade us that these spiritual gifts are only those natural gifts imparted at birth, of which we all have a share, consecrated upon conversion to God's service and cultivated and enlarged. The simple answer to this is that these nine gifts are bestowed by the Holy Spirit (I. Cor. xii. 7, 8).

ed for the Gifts of the Spirit.

Since the world of the unconverted cannot receive the Spirit of Truth because "it seeth Him not, neither knoweth Him" (John xiv. 17), it is evident that these gifts of the Spirit cannot be natural gifts of which the unconverted have as much a share as the converted.

No natural gift of learning languages can ever be called the gift of tongues, for we find fishermen speaking languages they had never learned (Acts ii. 7), neither could any aptitude for the study of medicine ever be classed as a gift of healing, for these same fishermen healed without the use of drugs or surgery (Acts iii. 6, 7).

Then there are not wanting others who say that the day for these supernatural gifts has passed and that they ceased on the death of the apostles. Quite apart from the fact that we have evidence that they are still in use to-day (since all over the world God has imparted these gifts to seeking hearts), the onus of proof rests upon such as make this claim to prove their assertion. Nowhere in Scripture does God so much as hint that these gifts are to be, or have been, withdrawn. He

GAVE THEM TO THE CHURCH,

for the "manifestation of the Spirit is given . . ." (I. Cor. xii. 7), and He hath set them in the Church (I. Cor. xii. 28), and nowhere does God say He has cancelled His gifts. Indeed the contrary is true for "the gifts and calling of God are without repentance" (Rom. xi. 29).

In the face of these scriptural facts how dare anyone assert what is so obviously untrue?

If anything else were needed to show the foolishness of such a contention one need only quote from history to show that whenever the Church of Christ was in a state of revival, these supernatural gifts were in operation. Mosheim's *Ecclesiastical History* gives instances from which I cull the following. Concerning the first century of the Christian era he writes:

"Many, as soon as they were baptised according to Christ's directions, and consecrated to God by prayer and the imposition of hands, were able immediately to express their thoughts in foreign languages which they had never learned, to foretell future events, to heal the sick by pronouncing the name of Jesus, to call the dead to life, and to perform other deeds above the power of man " (p. 22, Sec. 9, Reid's Edition).

"This rapid propagation of Christianity in the second century is ascribed by writers of the second century almost exclusively to the efficient will of God, to the energy of divine truth, and to the miracles wrought by Christians . . . the other gifts with which God favoured the rising Church of Christ were, as we learn from

NUMEROUS TESTIMONIES

of the ancients, still everywhere distributed " (p. 53, Sec. 6, and p. 54, Sec. 8).

Of the third century Mosheim writes: "Among the divine causes (for the enlargement of the Church in this century) besides the inherent energy of heavenly truth, and the piety and constancy of the Christian teachers, especially noticeable is that extraordinary providence of God, which we are informed, by means of dreams and visions, induced many persons who before were wholly thoughtless or alienateď Christianity, to come out at once and enrol their names among the followers of Christ, must be added the curing of diseases and other miracles which very many Christians still performed, by invoking the name of the Saviour " (p. 86, Sec. 4).

Irenæus, who was Bishop of Lyons from A.D. 178 until his martyrdom about A.D. 202, writes:

"Wherefore also those who are in truth the disciples, receiving grace from Him, do in His name perform miracles, so as to promote the welfare of others, according to the gift which each has received from Him...others still heal the sick by laying their hands upon them, and they are made whole."

It is therefore a fact that the miraculous gifts of the Spirit were in evidence until the third century after Christ and that the age of miracles did not cease upon the death of the apostles.

Whenever there has been a revival of the primitive faith and morals of the early Church there also has God revived the supernatural

GIFTS OF THE SPIRIT.

"These attend the cradle of every spiritual reformation, as they did the birth of the Church herself. Waldenses, Moravians, Huguenots, Covenanters, Friends, Baptists, and Methodists all have their record of them," says Dr. Gordon in *The Ministry of Healing*.

Thank God, these gifts of the Holy Spirit are still in the Church of Christ awaiting hearts that are humble enough to receive them.

HE recent Home-call of Dr. Dinsdale Young has meant a great loss to the Church of God. His death coming at this time is a challenge to every lover of the Word of God. "Who will fill the gan?"

The Rev. Luke Wiseman, in his appreciation, broadcast on the same night that Dr. Young died, reveals the reason why the ministry of this dear saint and servant of God was so wonderfully blessed. He gloried in the old-fashioned gospel. He based his sermons on the rock of evangelical teaching. He was in a very real sense a Fundamentalist.

Mr. Lloyd George, speaking of Dr. Dinsdale Young on the occasion of his Diamond Jubilee celebrations, said if the two generations of people to whom he had preached had followed his teaching, it would not have mattered what ministers sat around the table in Downing Street. What a statement from a great statesman, regarding a great Fundamentalist! It implies this, that the "old-fashioned Bible," and the "old-fashioned gospel" hold the key to many of our national problems. This is by no means new information, for wherever the gospel has been received men's hearts have been changed and the result has been seen also in changed conditions. No form of earthly government could ever accomplish this. It is the work of Christ alone.

He comes to break oppression, To set the captive free; To take away transgression, And rule in equity.

Yet to-day we find the very truths which have brought untold

being denied by those who are paid to proclaim them.

Nincteen centuries ago religion and the world joined hands to crucify the Lord of glory; it would appear that this union has never been dissolved, for to-day we see a determined opposition to divine revelation. While we are not pessimistic regarding the ultimate issue, because truth will triumph, yet we are concerned for the multitudes of people who, while having a cloke of profession, are being deluded, and instead of rejoicing in the truth are lost in the fog of modern

One of the favourite taunts of infidel speakers is that "Christians do not half believe what they profess to believe." Alas, we fear this taunt is sometimes justified. Those who reject religion altogether are prepared to do some hard thinking, while many who declare themselves Christians are content to let others do all the thinking for them.

theology.

If the godless conditions experienced on the Continent ever prevailed in this land it would be because the Church is ignorant of the power of the Devil, or is not willing to make sacrifices for the defence of truth. Christians of other lands are well aware of the dangers that threaten them, but here in England a condition of apathy prevails.

Hugh Redwood says the real danger is that of slackness on the side of religion and of

FAILURE TO REALISE

that a "new strategy" is urgently called for.

The low standard of spirituality, the lack of Bible knowledge, witnessed to-day is the outcome of modern theology proclaimed from many modern pulpits. Congregations who sit under and consent to these modern perversions are not willing to fight their way back to fundamental and historic Christianity. Mr. Redwood is perfectly right: "A new strategy is called for." It was when General Foch issued the command for the allied armies to put their backs to the wall that the advance which ended the war began. It is high time we Christians put our backs to the wall and began to contend earnestly for the faith which was once delivered to the saints.

The activities of the Devil in this country are different from those in Russia and Germany; instead of a mass attack from the outside he is bent on sabotage within. The raging storm outside fails to injure the gospel ship, so he tries to get those within to hole the vessel from inside.

Those who ought to be feeding the guns which defend the castle are spending their time pouring water on the powder. To cover up their failure, they compromise with the world; to hide their ever-decreasing statistics, Sunday films and dances are introduced. Yet it is only this old-fashioned gospel that is the power of God unto salvation. Let us briefly review some of the fundamentals that are being denied to-day.

1. Is the Bible infallible?

AN INFIDEL SPEAKER

in one of the London parks was asked why he always attacked the Bible and no other book. "Why cannot you let it alone?" he was asked? "Because it won't let me alone," he replied. I believe this is the difficulty with many of our Bible critics. I may be asked, "But surely you do not believe in an actual Garden of Eden?" Yes, I believe in it just as much as I believe in those beautiful gardens I was privileged to visit last summer.

"But really you do not believe that the sun stood still?" I certainly do. Surely it is not unreasonable

to believe that He who created the sun should possess the power to control its movements?,

Yes, I even believe the story of Jonah and the whale, in spite of all that the critics have to say. This account of Jonah has been confirmed by more than one well-authenticated incident.

Sixty-three Years of Engineering Science and Social Work, by Sir Francis Fox, records an incident told to the engineer by the manager of a whaling station.

In the vicinity of the Falkland Islands in February, 1891, two boats attacked a sperm whale which, with a lash of its tail, upset one of the boats. One of the men thrown into the water, James Bartley, could not be found. The whale was killed, and next morning the stomach was hoisted on board the whaling ship. The sailors were startled by something which gave spasmodic signs of life, and inside was found the missing sailor, doubled up and unconscious.

He was kindly and

CAREFULLY TREATED

by the captain and ficers and gradually regained possession of his senses. At the end of the third week he had entirely recovered from the shock and resumed his duties. Bartley affirmed that he would probably have lived inside his house of flesh until he starved, for he lost his senses through fright and not from lack of air. It finally dawned upon him that he had been swallowed by a whale and he was overcome with horror at the situation. He could breathe easily, but the heat was terrible. Death stared him in the face, he tried to look at it bravely, but the terrible quiet, darkness and heat combined with horrible knowledge of his environment, overcome him. Other incidents could be given to prove this long-assailed Bible story, but without outside confirmation, the fact that our Lord believed it is enough for us.

The Modernist says the Bible cannot be accepted as infallible because much contained therein is not fit for young people to read, and again because parts of the Old Testament encourage cruelty. Against this I would say that in the whole of Christendom it would be impossible to find one life which has been made impure by reading the Word of God. An unclean book would cause its readers to be unclean, but the noblest lives have been those shaped by the Word of God. No one has ever been ruined by reading the Bible. It is because the Bible has been neglected in our homes that many of the young

PEOPLE OF THIS GENERATION

are so godless and immoral.

The person who does not like the Bible, who is critical of its contents, and shocked at its records, has never experienced its power in their life.

A lady who excelled in making wax flowers and fruit was criticised severely by her friends and her work unjustly derided. She convicted them by showing them an apple with which they, as usual, found fault. One complained of the colour, another of the shape, and so on. When they had finished she silently took a knife, cut the apple and ate it. In like manner test the Bible—prove its power and its truth, and cease criticising it.

2. Was Jesus born of a virgin?

The Virgin Birth of Jesus has been proved in many wavs:

(a) By the testimony of Scripture. Prophesied by Isaiah, announced by angels to both Mary and Joseph (Luke i. 34, 35; Matt. i. 20-23). These angelic announcements leave no doubt whatever in the mind of the child of God of the supernatural nature of the birth of Jesus.

The chapters containing the account of the Virgin Birth are in every ancient manuscript. If these chapters are to be rejected, then the entire books must be rejected.

(b) This fact was accepted by the apostles and early Christians. The whole Church right down the ages has accepted this fact (though creeds have differed to some extent). For 1,900 years

THE VIRGIN BIRTH

has been believed by the main body of Christian believers.

(c) The greatest proof of all is the pre-existence of Christ. In the beginning was the Word, the Word was with God and the Word was God. He came out of eternity into time. Bethlehem did not mark the beginning of His life, but was just an incident in it. Those words "in the beginning" carry us back beyond even those early records of creation, for "by Him were all things created" (Col. i. 16). And the Word was made flesh (the wise men recognised He was God, and worshipped Him. If He had not been God their worship would have been idolatry). It was God taking upon Himself humanity. Not only God dwelling in man, for there are many with such an experience to-day. He was God and man combining in one personality the two natures. It is impossible to accept Jesus as the great Teacher, Leader or Example and reject the Virgin Birth.

Christ, by highest heaven adored, Christ, the everlasting Lord, Late in time behold Him come, Offspring of a virgin's womb. Veiled in flesh the Godhead see, Hail, the incarnate Deity, Pleased as man with man to dwell, Jesus our Immanuel.

Another question being asked to-day is:

Can the miracles of the New Testament be accepted?

One of the greatest proofs of the New Testament miracles is that Jesus Christ, who is always the same (Heb. xiii. 8), is performing like miracles in these days. Inspiration foresaw that a time would come when attempts would be made to take away portions of the Bible, and recorded a warning to all such (Rev. xxii. 19).

The result of accepting these very truths that are being challenged to-day is that lives have been changed, lost hopes have been regained, fetters snapped, and slaves released.

The gospel is still the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth. The theme of the Bible is Jesus, you will find Him the Key to all your problems, the Panacea for all ills, the Refuge in storm, the Defence in battle, and above all, the Saviour and Redeemer of your soul.

Christian Biographical Series.

George Muller of Bristol (No. 4)

MOTIVES & FURTHER DEVELOPMENTS.

By Principal P. G. PARKER

O one can understand George Muller's life who does not understand the main motive behind it. He loved all children—but that was not the main motive behind his work. He especially pitied poor children, who had both parents dead, and who were without relatives to support them—yet even this was not the main motive of his work. His words have been quoted again and again, but the briefest account of his life necessitates their repetition:

"I certainly did from my heart desire to be used by God to benefit the bodies of poor children bereaved of both parents, and seek, in other respects, with the help of God, to do them good for this life. I also particularly longed to be used of God in getting the dear orphans trained up in the fear of God; but still the first and primary object of the institution was, and still is, that God might be magnified by the fact that the orphans under my care were, and are, provided with all they need only by prayer and faith, without anyone being asked by me or my fellow labourers, whereby it might be seen that God is faithful still and hears prayer still.

That I was not mistaken has been abundantly proved both by the conversion of many sinners, who have read the accounts which have been published in connection with this work, and also by the abundance of fruit that has followed in the

HEARTS OF THE SAINTS

for which from my inmost soul I desire to be grateful to God, and the honour and glory of which not only is due to Him alone, but which I, by His help, am enabled to ascribe to Him."

So George Muller prayed on and moved on. Never asking anyone for a penny—but God alone. The money came. By pennies and pounds. By farthings and thousands.

At last he closed the rented houses in Wilson Street and moved out to Ashley Down. On Ashley Down, Bristol, God's plan reached its fruition. "Whatsoever God produceth shall come to perfection." Yes, in perfect surroundings George Muller was enabled to build five large orphan houses to home 2,000 orphans. How it was done has been told in a number of detailed lives of this God-blessed philanthropist.

Covering a period of twenty-one years the building continued. First a home for 300. Then two more to hold 850. "Enough," one would naturally say. So did George Muller, naturally. But then he was not working naturally. He was working supernaturally. So he determined to increase the accommodation up to 2,000. Said he, "I am not a fanatic or enthusiast, but, as all who know me are well aware, a calm, cool, quiet, calculating business man; and therefore I should be

UTTERLY OVERWHELMED

looking at it naturally. But as the whole of this work was commenced, and ever has been gone on with, in

faith, trusting in the living God alone for everything, so it is also regarding this intending enlargement. I look to the Lord alone for helpers, land, means, and everything else needed. I have pondered the difficulties for months, and have looked steadily at every one of them; but faith in God has put them all aside."

So on January 6th, 1870, No. 5 Orphan House was opened, and 2,000 children were homed by a poor man who trusted in a rich God. The buildings themselves cost about £120,000.

Mr. Muller in his early years was freed from military service in Germany because of frailty of body. He was threatened with consumption and was never robust. Yet he lived to be ninety-two years of age! God's grace and strength were sufficient for him.

Over a million pounds passed through his hands. During his lifetime he received for himself £81,490. For the orphans £988,829. For missionary work and Bible distribution £460,000. A total of £1,448,829. His own gifts were given away again, so that he died, even as he commenced, a poor man.

"The funeral took place on Monday, March 14th, 1898, and never had such a scene been witnessed in Bristol before. Although all the arrangements were carried out with the

STRICT SIMPLICITY

that he himself would have desired, tens of thousands gathered to witness the cortege pass from the Orphan Homes to Bethesda Chapel, and thence to Arno's Vale Cemetery. The immense crowds that thronged the route from end to end were most orderly, reverent, and sympathetic, and scarcely a business house in the city omitted to draw its blinds or put up black shutters, while from the cathedral, city and suburban churches, and public buildings, flags floated half-mast, and muffled peals were rung in several instances."

Critical Comments on Current Concerns

Whose Hand is This? The following is culled from the "Daily

Herald," February 8th:
" Quebec, which has suffered from a " red literature " scare since the semi-Fascist Duplessis Government took office in Montreal Province, has a new book on its danger list. It is the Bible. Officials of the Grand Ligne Mission, a French Canadian Baptist body, report that their local missionary has been forbidden to distribute the New Testament. A police super-intendent explains that the Bible might camouflage "other forms of propaganda."

Under a by-law, passed in 1933, it is a punishable offence to distribute in the streets of the city any book, pamphlet, or circular without written permission beforehand from the Chief of Police. It is not very difficult to trace the sinister hand behind this work. Quebec is overwhelmingly Romanist, and the Pope has declared the Bible in the tongue of the people to be a "poisonous pasture."

It was in Quebec that the notorious Rahard case occurred. The Rev. Victor Rahard was a Roman priest till 1928, when, by the grace of God, he was brought into the light and liberty of the Gospel of Christ. He became Rector of the Church of the Redeemer in Montreal. In 1933 thousands of French Romanists in Quebec revolted against the Church of Rome. Many turned atheists and communists, and burned down some costly churches. Large numbers, however, came under the ministry of the Rev. Rahard, and it is estimated that some five thousand were converted. There are now six congregations of converted Romanists in Montreal. In 1934, the Rev. Rahard was arrested in Montreal on a charge of blasphemy because he had called the Mass a blasphemous superstition. On January 25th, 1934, he was placed in the Dock with criminals, finger-printed and partially stripped. The case was twice adjourned, and then on February 9th, the Crown prosecuted. Rahard's Counsel dropped a bombshell by holding up the Church of England Prayer Book and challenging the Court's jurisdiction in the following words: "The Rev. Victor Rahard is not on trial here. The Prayer Book of the Church of England, of which King George V, is the head, is on its trial. How can the Crown Attorney, representing the King, charge the Rev V. Rahard with blasphemy when Article 31 of the King's Prayer Book declares the Mass to be a blasphemous fable and a dangerous deceit?"

The case was adjourned seven times during 1934, and finally, on April 25th, 1935, Dr. Rahard was found guilty by a French-Canadian Romanist judge, and sentenced to a fine of £20 or one month's imprisonment.

Popish Suppression was well emphasised in the above case. of Public Services I quote from a manifesto issued by the Protestant Truth Society on August 1st,

1935, to all the members of British Parliaments. has been subjected to repeated postponements, but there has apparently been a conspiracy of silence on the part of Reuter, the Press Association and the B.B.C. in withholding news. The suppression included a Test Cable sent on June 16th, 1934, to the Press Association announcing Dr. Rahard's triumphant acquittal on a second charge of posting up notices of meetings on his own church. A strong representation was made by the United Protestant Council about this suppression, and the Press Association blamed Reuter; but Reuter denied this responsi-The Test Cable was sent direct to the Press Association who, when confronted with the copy, admitted receiving The manager then offered the flimsy excuse that as the cable did not come by Reuter, they did not send it out to the British papers. The Freemasons and Orange Order of Canada took the matter in hand and traced the cause of the suppression in the first place to the Canadian News Service, owned by a Roman Catholic, Henri Gagnon, proprietor of the Quebec newspaper "Le Soleil." A brief, misleading account of Dr. Rahard's conviction on April 25th, 1935, was cabled, but all details suppressed.'

My Heart's in the East End! So said Cardinal Hinsley the other day when opening a school for training up a young army of papists in London's poor

quarters. I wonder where his pocket is? I believe he gets in the neighbourhood of £20,000 a year. The heart of his predecessor, Cardinal Bourne, was probably at Buckingham Palace, because he was fond of talking about the day when the English King might fall in love with the Vatican.

The Martyr Pope (?). In the course of much flattery offered to the Cardinal at the above function, one speaker suggested that he would one day become Pope, to which Hinsley replied: "I have no ambition to wear the white robe. One day, maybe, I shall have a red mark on my neck, but such a quick exit from this world would not be so painful as the constant martydom of the pope." Now that is news to us. We should have thought that the Vicar of Christ would be living in a state of unbounded joy rather than an unceasing martyrdom.

Teetotalers Pay Less. So announced the "Daily Herald" recently. The Directors of the Eagle Star Insurance Company have decided to grant 10 per cent. concessions on the usual premium to motorists who are pledged abstainers, and signify their intention to remain so. Company knows what it is doing. In course of business to-day, I called at the office of a very large builders' merchant, which firm uses a large fleet of motor lorries. Whilst waiting in the lobby, I was interested to observe a notice which read as follows: "It has come to our knowledge that certain of our drivers are taking alcohol during the course of their work. It cannot be too highly emphasised that alcohol, even in small quantities has a detrimental effect upon the driving capabilities of any individual, and we wish it to be definitely understood that the consuming of alcoholic drink during any driving period, including meal times, is strictly prohibited, and will not under any circumstances, be tolerated."

Blood Money. In the "News Chronicle," February 10th, the following item appeared. "The Chancellor of the Exchequer gives the liquor revenue figures for 1937 as follows: Beer, home and imported, £65,546,000. Spirits: home and imported, £36,610,000. Wines: £5,626,000. Hop and hop extracts, £165,000. This may appear to be very lucrative on the surface, but what if we could get the opinion of the thousands of women who have continually felt the weight of a drunken husband's fist, and the thousands of little children who go to school on empty stomachs because the family income has been half-absorbed by the blood-sucking brewer? I called at a home this week on Monday, and there wasn't a penny in the house to buy food for the whole of the week. And there were six little children, the eldest a boy of nine. And yet the father is in regular work, earning over £3 a week.

A Knock-Out. The above reminds me of the two poor, ill-clad women, both with black eyes and bruised faces. They were gazing at the Brewer's latest handiwork, a blatant poster proclaiming the alleged powers of strong drink. These words were printed across it—"Beer with a punch in it." One turned to the other and exclaimed: "Ay, and we know it."

For this, the Royal Humane Society has The Bravest Deed of the Year. presented the Stanhope gold medal to Ernest Hill of Rugby Street, Hull. On the night of November 8th, 1936, while the steam trawler, Northern Spray, was shooting her trawl off the west coast of Iceland in bad weather, Harold Daniels, aged 18, was swept overboard in the pitch darkness. Hill dived overboard in full fishing kit and sea boots. He got his man, and although both suffered terribly from cramp in the icy water, a thrilling rescue, taking nearly 20 minutes, was accomplished. Well done Hill! A magnificent deed. Here is a lesson for us Christians. There are men sinking in the darkness all around us. What Became of the Seven Churches of Asia? (continued)

Philadelphia (Rev. iii. 7-13). This city stood about twenty-five miles south-east from Sardis. It was the second city of Lydia, and was built by King Attalus Philadelphus, from whom it received its name. The city with the surrounding country came into the possession of the Romans in the year 133 B.C. It long withstood the power of the Turks, and was not taken until 1392.

It is noteworthy, as stated by Mr. Hartley, in the "Missionary Register," "the circumstance that Philadelphia is now called Allah-Shehr, 'the city of God,' when viewed in connection with the promises made to that church, and especially with that of writing the name of the city of God upon its faithful members, is, to say the least, a singular concurrence." It is also very remarkable to note the connection between the promise in the twelfth verse: "Him that overcometh, will I make a pillar in the temple of My God," and the remark made by Gibbon about this city: "Among the Greek colonies and churches of Asia, Philadelphia is still erect; a column in a

scene of ruins." There is still to be seen standing amid the ruins one solitary pillar reminding the traveller, as it were, of the promise made to those who resist the moral decay and corruptions of the present age,

Barnes in his notes on the New Testament informs us that this city still covers a considerable extent of ground, running up the slopes of four hills, or rather of one hill, with four flat summits. The country, as viewed from these hills is very magnificent—gardens and vineyards lying at the back and sides of the town, and before it one of the most beautiful and extensive plains of Asia. "It is indeed an interesting circumstance," says Mr. Hartley, "to find Christianity more flourishing here than in many other parts of the Turkish empire: there is still a numerous Christian population; they occupy three hundred houses. Divine service is performed every Sunday in five churches." Dr. Keith, in his book: "Evidence of Prophecy," remarks: "Nor is it less interesting, in these eventful times, and notwithstanding the general degeneracy of the Greek Church, to learn that the present bishop of Philadelphia accounts 'the Bible the only foundation of all religious belief'; and that he admits that 'abuses have entered into the church, which former ages might endure; but the present must put them down."

Let it be noted that Philadelphia is one of the two churches with which the Lord found no fault, and which received no word of rebuke from His mouth.

GOWANBRAES. By Margaret P. Neill. (Messrs. Thynne & Co., Ltd. 3/6, by post 3/10).

An interesting novel with a definite scriptural tone. The reader's attention is held from beginning to end by a cleverly-thought-out mystery, with touches of romance, and it can therefore be classed as a book with special appeal to young people. The introduction of travel and life in India is especially helpful and unusual, giving an insight into the ways and customs of the people. The underlying Gospel teaching makes it a book that is worthy of recommendation, as throughout its pages the reader is kept interested and instructed in the things that matter most.—E. G. B.

It is significant that the Evolutionist refused to allow publication of his defence.

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
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
