Abraham, William J. *The Logic of Evangelism*, Grand Rapids: Eerdmans, 1989. A contemporary treatment aimed at scholars. Much to be challenged by but some to disagree with at the same time.

Chantry, Walter. *Today's Gospel: Authentic or Synthetic?* Edinburgh: Banner of Truth Trust, 1970. A provocative little book which challenges the *synthetic* message passing as the gospel in our generation.

Banks, William L. *In Search of the Great Commission*, Chicago: Moody Press, 1991. An exegetical work dealing with key texts setting forth the commission.

Bassett, Paul. *God's Way*, Darlington, England: Evangelical Press, 1981. The goal of true evangelism is the glory of God. Believes power is given in the recovery of the message and method of true evangelism.

Boston, Thomas. *The Art of Man-Fishing*, Grand Rapids: Baker Book House, 1977 reprint. A Puritan classic which urges persistence in fishing for men with the gospel message.

Clark, Gordon H. *Today's Evangelism: Counterfeit or Genuine?* Jefferson, MD: The Trinity Foundation, 1990. A hardhitting book typical of Clark's rigid logical thought process which will disturb many and help those who are ready for the scriptural arguments ably defended.

*Coleman, Robert E. *The Master Plan of Evangelism*, Old Tappan, NJ: Fleming H. Revell, 1963. A true classic in this field, useful in small groups with the available study guide. I would heartily urge all to read this work.

*Drummond, Lewis A. *The Word of the Cross: A Contemporary Theology of Evangelism*, Nashville: Broadman Press, 1992. A major work that can be read by non-scholars as well as academically trained readers. This should become one of the standards in the field. Serious study of evangelism from every aspect of thought. Highly commended.

*Green, Michael. *Evangelism in the Early Church*, Grand Rapids: Eerdmans, 1970. One of the most important books on the subject of evangelism for those seriously interested in the first centuries of the church. Highly regarded and recommended.

Green, Michael. *Evangelism Now and Then*, Downers Grove, IL: InterVarsity Press, 1979. The author has written many books on the subject of evangelism, this being one of his best contributions.

Kuiper, R.B. *God-Centered Evangelism*, Grand Rapids: Baker Book House, 1961. Presents in concise and thoughtful way the theology of evangelism. Should be read seriously by those who study the subject.

Little, Paul E. *How to Give Away Your Faith*, Downers Grove, IL: InterVarsity Press, 1966. A modern classic of *how to's* of effective witnessing which gives answers to commonly asked questions.

*McGrath, Alister E. *Explaining Your Faith*, Grand Rapids: Zondervan, 1989. A little gem from a very impressive modern writer, which will help explain and defend the Christian faith in the modern Western world.

*Metzger, Will. *Tell the Truth*, Downers Grove: InterVarsity Press, 1981. Far and away the best theological treatment

published in recent years, dealing with the message of the gospel as well as the methods for proclaiming it effectively. Designed as a training manual, this is much more than a simplistic manual.

Miles, Delos. *Master Principles of Evangelism*, Nashville: Broadman Press, 1982. A book about *how* Jesus won people to Himself.

Miles, Delos. *How Jesus Won Persons*, Nashville: Broadman Press, 1982. A sequel to the above title.

Miles, Delos. *Overcoming Barriers to Witnessing*, Nashville: Broadman Press, 1984. How can we overcome objections raised against the gospel? A professor's helpful suggestions.

Miller, C. John. *Evangelism & Your Church*, Phillipsburg, NJ: Presbyterian & Reformed Publishing Company, 1980. Sees Reformed theology as an "unspent treasure" for doing evangelism. Practical and useful.

Morgan, G. Campbell. *Evangelism*, Grand Rapids: Baker Book House, 1976. Five sermons in the simple style of the famous preacher.

*Murray, Iain H. *The Invitation System*, Edinburgh: Banner of Truth, 1967. A 40-page booklet which carries the arguments against much contemporary methodology in giving "altar calls" to significant conclusions. Whether you agree or not you will have to think.

*Packer, J.I. *Evangelism and the Sovereignty of God*, Downers Grove, IL: InterVarsity Press, 1961. The all-time best book on both this subject and the whole matter of the message to be

preached and the motive for preaching it. A must read for all.

*Reisinger, Ernest C. *Today's Evangelism: Its Message and Methods*, Phillipsburg, NJ: Craig Press, 1982. A good treatment of the many modern abuses that plague contemporary evangelism. Deals well with methods.

*Spurgeon, Charles H. *The Soul Winner*, Grand Rapids: Eerdmans, n.d. One of the truly great classics on witnessing available in several formats and reprinted editions.

Stott, John R.W. *Christian Mission in the Modern World*, Downers Grove, IL: InterVarsity Press, 1975. A careful definition of five key terms—mission, evangelism, dialogue, salvation and conversion. As in most Stott books the treatment is exegetical and helpful.

Stott, John R.W. *Our Guilty Silence*, Downers Grove, IL: InterVarsity Press, 1967. A challenge to the contemporary church to recover its vision for solid evangelism.

Wright, Eric. *Tell the World*, Darlington, England: Evangelical Press, 1981. The author worked in a hard and unresponsive Islamic mission field and was forced to consider the message and method of evangelism more carefully.
